876 584 876 Continued from Page 1. The scene was a sad one. The ceme-tery occupies a space of about eight acres, and all the paths were guarded by armed soldiers. The ground was thickly occupied by the living 'and dead. Physicians who were present were busily engaged in setting broken bones, sewing up and dressing gaping wounds and otherwise attending to the wants of the injured. So great was the demand for medical and sur-gical asistance, that physicians and surgeons were requisitioned from other cities and towns. The Decad Piled Up The dead were piled in long lines






