Ores to the Granby Smelter
—Survey's Run.

AN IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENT.

Rise in Republic, Crown's Nest Coal
and War Eagle—Mining Stock

Grand Forks, B.C., Oct. 14.—(Special.)—The actual work of construction of the Grand Forks-Repulse railway is to start before the end of October. The preliminary survey between the two points to be connected by the railway is about completed. After years of hard fighting the citizens of Grand Forks are now in a fair position to see the object of their ambition—an independent railway—realized.
