GET OUT THE VOTES IS NEW YORK CRY

Hughes and Hearst in Final Week With a Rush.

THE UP-STATE FIGHT IS HARD

Uncertainty as to Breaks in Party Lines Adds Interest to the Closing Struggle.

New York, Oct. 31.—Those trite sayings about "whirlwind finishes" and "girding of loins for the home stretch" and the like, lose their force when applied to the situation that confronts the voters of New York. "Burn up the town!" is the figurative command issued at the Hearst League headquarters with reference to the local end of the contest.

"Get out every vote!" was the quiet word of command sent to the country leaders from the Republican state headquarters.

No means within the range of political genius will be overlooked in the carrying out of the orders from the rival generals. As day follows day between now and the date of election the details of operation that have been held in reserve will be unfolded and it suffices to say at present that a period of unprecedented excitement and a series of possibly unparalleled sensations are in order.

For their candidate. The time is approaching when the groups of bandwagon jumpers, who possess greater or lesser ability at the polls and generally decide which way to jump about the Saturday before election, form objects of serious consideration.

Instructions have been given to all the subalterns in the Hearst movement to talk nothing except certain and sweeping victory from now on. Max Ihmsen, Mr. Hearst's personal representative and campaign manager, gave the cue by issuing a statement declaring the fight for Hearst had been won and needs only the assurance of a fair count of the votes, following this with charges that Republicans are colonizing in the rural districts.

"We are receiving numerous reports of false registration up the state," declared Manager Ihmsen. "These cases are being investigated by local lawyers, and every effort will be made to prevent the polling of fraudulent votes on election day."

"Reports from Albany indicate that a vast system of fraudulent registration has been put into operation. Mr. Barnes is the head of the Republican machine in Albany County."

"The 15,000 signers of the state petitions are organizing themselves into a volunteer watchers' army."

William Barnes, jun., who for years has managed the up-state end of Republican campaigns and was at one time slated for successor to State Chairman Odell, denied the Ihmsen charges with respect to Albany County, with the brief statement that anyone who would attempt fraud on election day was a fool.

"There hasn't been any colonizing in Albany since 1894, when our organization captured the county," said Mr. Barnes. "There used to be colonizing, but we have been in power ever since it was stopped."

According to the talk today the Republican state leaders do not expect that Tammany will knife Hearst to any great extent, believing that Murphy has got to "make good." They do not think, however, that there will be any colonizing tactics adopted this year, it being taken for granted that Tammany's enthusiasm or intention to play fair with the ticket will not go that far. Sometimes, when Tammany has been especially anxious for victory as well as to "make good," colonizers have been run in by the thousands. The Hughes strength, the Republicans argue, will come mostly through the Democratic defection among elements removed from Murphy's influence and through the conditions in Kings County.

A remarkably good piece of politics has been played by the Hearst league in retaining David Bennett Hill to appear for it at Albany tomorrow before the court of appeals, which will hear argument on the decision of the appellate division throwing off the ticket many of Hearst's local candidates.

For years Senator Hill was the controlling force in Democratic state politics, continuing as such practically up to the time, a year or two ago, when he announced his intention of never again taking an active part. The recent Buffalo convention was the first Democratic state convention of years that he has not attended. His appearance in the Hearst league's legal contest, if it is taken as evincing his favor for the personal and political fortunes of Mr. Hearst, would be expected to have some influence with the old line Democrats who are breaking to Hughes.

The rival candidates for governor will finish their work up the state before the end of the week and return to make things hum in the greater city. When Mr. Hearst returns to town Thursday morning he will enter upon a programme that scarcely provides any time for sleep until election day. He will speak at the docks at noon meetings and all over the city nights. He will wind up his remarkable fight in McCarran's stronghold of Brooklyn with the biggest kind of mass meeting, spectacular effects can produce on Monday night.

Mr. Hughes will strike the greater city a day behind Mr. Hearst, and he, too, will be on the jump day and night. He is scheduled for twelve meetings a night on Friday and Saturday nights up and down the whole length of the island on both sides.

There is an unusually heavy registration in many parts of the state outside of New York City and this affords some of the basis for the charges that are made. In many of the larger cities the registration exceeds that of the presidential campaign two years ago. Wherever this increase prevails it is taken as an indication of Republican advantage because the Republicans in the counties north of the Harlem have the only thorough organization, and an organization primarily gets its voters registered.

Many of the canvasses made in the country, tallying in several cases with reports from outside observers, forecast an even greater vote for Hughes than was cast for Roosevelt when he received a plurality of 175,000 for president. In many additional cases the local leaders promise that Higgins' vote for governor is certain to be exceeded. After discounting all these reports the Republican managers now are satisfied with the outlook for at least 130,000 to 140,000 up the state. If Hughes is to come to the Harlem with a plurality beyond that the managers say it will be idle to speculate on the landslide.

The Hearst managers also get reports from the counties in the country, but as they have not the means of making a man to man canvass that are possessed by the Republican organizations in every election district, they have to be content with predictions and judgments based on surface signs as their lieutenants view them. The Republican leaders in the country election districts have been impressed for

years with a regard for their responsibility in furnishing correct information whether it be favorable or unfavorable to their party. For many years the pre-election canvass has given a very close estimate of the actual vote of the several parties.

In the strictly rural counties the town and district leaders state with striking frequency, in the space devoted to "remarks" on their canvass report blanks, that they find many Democrats who are going to vote for Hughes, but have not heard of any Republicans who are going to vote for Hearst. Knowledge of this situation among the farmers is one of the main causes for the extra effort which the Hearst managers will make to break into the Republican ranks in the enemy's strongholds.

In several of the cities, however, there is a shift both ways—a strong tide setting toward Hearst on the part of Republican laboring men, but another tide setting to Hughes on the part of old-line Democrats. At this stage, with some of the canvassing still to be completed, it is impossible to tell accurately which is the stronger tide. Unbiased reports indicate that Republican pluralities are likely to be considerably reduced in the Susquehanna Valley counties along the southern tier and in the Mohawk Valley counties. But that this walling off will be neutralized by Democratic factional fights in Oswego, Jefferson, Cayuga, Wayne and Erie counties and by apparently assured Republican gains in the rural counties is most probable.

Elections, and especially elections of the character of one now agitating the state of New York, are never really won or lost until the ballots are counted. It cannot be told what sensations may be sprung and what they may accomplish during the next six days, but as matters stand there is nothing in the situation to change the judgment previously expressed in these dispatches—that Hughes is a strong leader in the race.

Money is a potent instrument and money may cut a figure still in the Hughes-Hearst contest. Money is a weapon both sides can use, however, provided they get their hands on it. There is ample evidence that money is going up the state in good-sized chunks this week. Reports are at hand of Democratic local leaders up the state who have more money in hand right now for use in the last days of the campaign and upon election day than they ever had before.

It is reported, but not so definitely, that the money is being distributed by Chairman Connors, of the Democratic state committee, and if that be so some real use has been found at last for the Democratic state committee in this campaign. As to where Mr. Connors gets the money he may have to disburse is a question affording a good deal of speculation. One theory is that Mr. Hearst, seeing the need for having the election workers thoroughly or-

ganized, has chosen the Democratic organization as a distributing agency rather than leave the final financing of matters of his own league organization.

In spite of the professed paucity of funds in the hands of the central Republican organization, it is understood the Republican county leaders will have adequate means for getting out the vote. Anyway, the Republican leaders do not seem at all alarmed by what they learn of the tapping of a Democratic or Hearst barrel from some source. They are relying on their organized ability, with enough financial assistance to give it force, to bring to the polls the voters who have not been brought fifteen or twenty in a wagon over several miles of country roads on election days.
