## Acosta, Griffith's New Cuban, Is Clever, But Temperamental

His Prima Donna Tactics  
Amusing—Leaves Game If  
Support Isn't Good—  
Chooses Opponents, Too.

Washington got an iron man and a temperamental athlete besides when Clark Griffith bought Joe Acosta from Rochester. The Cuban curver this year did the Joe McGinnity and he also displayed prima donna tactics, once taking himself out of the box because he thought he wasn't getting proper support.

On June 14, with his team facing a flock of double-headers and short-handed for pitchers, Acosta worked twice against Syracuse and won both his games, the scores being 3 to 1 and 3 to 3. In the two sections of the twin bill he allowed 19 hits. The double performance didn't seem to hurt him, for on his next appearance on the mound he blanked Jersey City.

On July 11 the Rochester team took the field against Syracuse with a record of twelve straight defeats and with Acosta pitching. He disappeared from the hill at the end of the sixth with his team behind 3 to 1, probably peeved over something.

Owner Chapin of the Hustlers came down to the press box later to find out how many errors had been made behind Acosta, and found that the Cuban's supporting cast had performed faultlessly.

Acosta, in the international, was in the habit of pitching against the clubs he wanted to. There were some he wouldn't face. He was reckoned as one of the smartest pitchers on the Futa circuit.

Griff seems to like to have Cubans round him. He had Marrans and Imelda in Cincinnati and in Washington he has had Calvo, Balmadero, Acosta, Torres and now Joe Acosta. The old fox has also bought from Rochester an outfielder named Holahan, who is putting in his first year in professional ball. One of the things Holahan did this year was to triple and forget to touch first. Holahan reports when the international season is over on September 20.

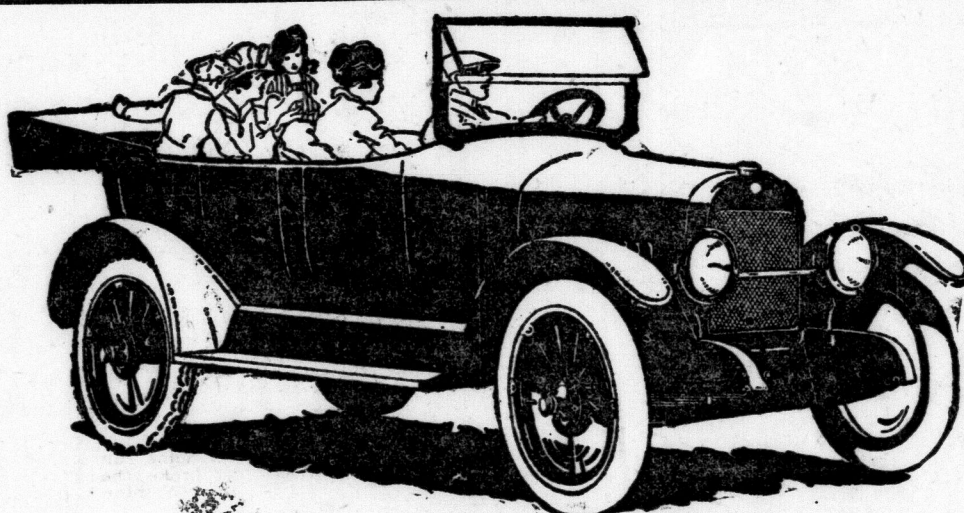

### SECURES TIE DECISION.

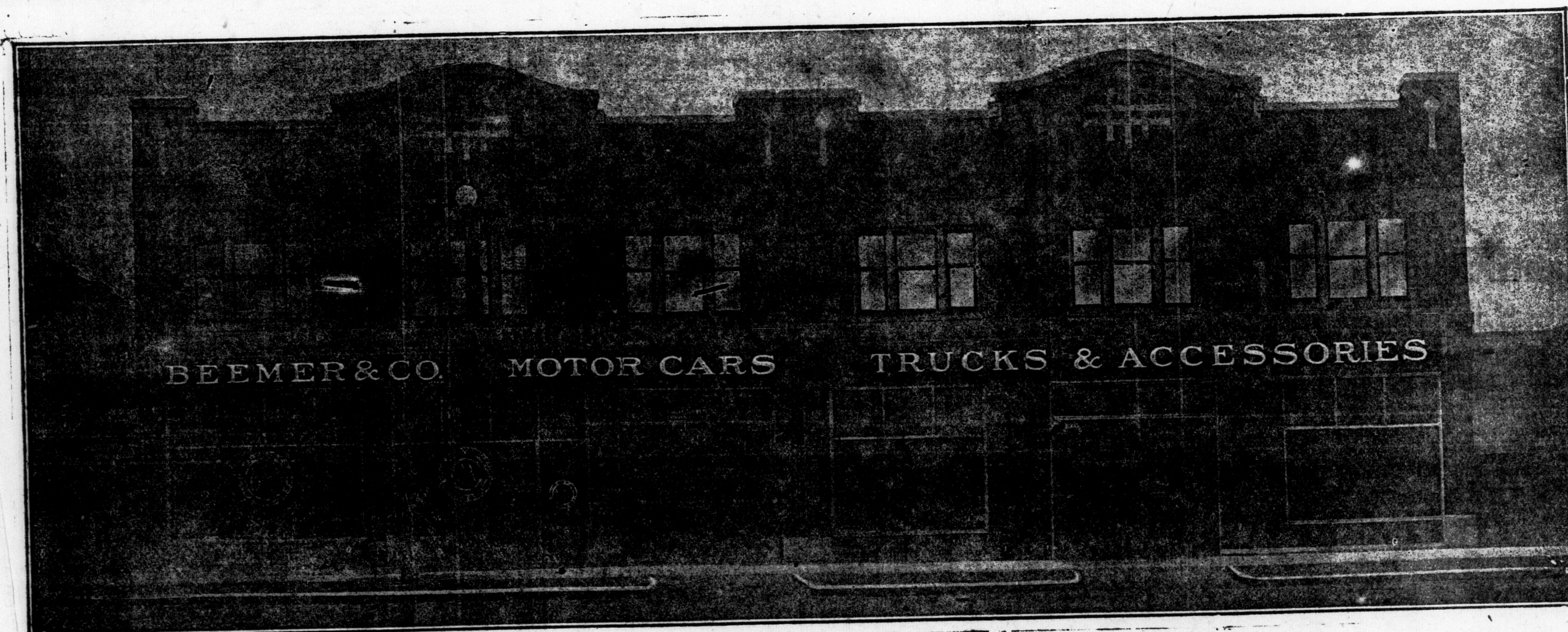
