CENTRAL VETERANS INDORSE JUVENILE COURT PROPOSITION

Want Joint Meeting of Representative Organizations, Officials, On Matter.

SEEK COAL SUPPLY

To Communicate With Western Dealers—Free University Education Plans Outlined.

Members of the Central Veterans' Council at a meeting held in the armories last night went on record as favoring a juvenile court for this city, and decided to co-operate with local organizations in sympathy with this movement. The secretary was accordingly instructed to communicate with the local Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club, Labor Representation committee and Mayor E. S. Little to arrange if possible a joint meeting to formulate plans for the establishment of the court immediately.

The members expressed the opinion that returned men are now financially embarrassed in the community and should be willing to co-operate in the establishment of a juvenile court. A written promise of any assistance possible was received from Dr. H. A. Stevenson, M.L.A., and the interest of the attorney-general will be solicited in this scheme by the council.

In an effort to solve the fuel problem for the coming winter the meeting decided to get in touch with coal dealers in the Canadian West on information supplied to the effect that there is a supply available there. It is understood that several municipal coal yards in Western Canada have obtained fuel, via Calgary dealers, and that the council will interview local coal merchants with the object of working in harmony with them this winter and obtaining supplies for returned soldiers of the city with the least possible difficulty.

Free Education. Lieut.-Col. W. J. Brown addressed the meeting and outlined plans backed by the Y. M. C. A., whereby free university education to returned soldiers scheme returned men availing themselves of the opportunity shall be required to pay 25 per cent of the cost of the term the fee shall be remitted. An appropriation to make this plan practical has been made for the local Y. M. C. A., and if enough candidates make it feasible the work will be undertaken here. Similar action is contemplated by the "Y" throughout the Dominion.

The council indorsed this generous offer, and steps will be taken to secure extension of the district with the plans, in an effort to awaken sufficient interest to make them practical.

Lieut.-Col. J. P. Brown, president of the council, acted as chairman at the meeting.

IMPERIAL NIGHT IS ONE OF CELEBRATION FOR ORANGE LODGES

Big Banquet Held in Masonic Temple—Hundreds of Visitors Present.

When 300 members of the Star of Bethlehem, L. O. L. 2769, celebrated Imperial Night last night in honor of their guests, members of the Imperial L. O. L. 2767, of Toronto, the greatest night in the history of Orangemen in London was created. After a long session of degree work held in Ulster hall, at Clarence and Dundas streets, and ended the assembly with a banquet, which included many out-of-town visitors besides the Imperials, made merry around the banquet tables in the Masonic Hall.

Over 600 members of the Toronto lodge arrived in this city at 8:30 by special car. They were met by a reception committee and Hackett L. O. L. 865, five and drum band, which led the way to Ulster Hall. After a long degree work concluded the band, headed by a fluttering Union Jack and followed by a procession of blocks long, marched down Dundas street to Richmond, then back Queen's avenue to the Masonic Temple.

In the great dining-hall, which was richly and artistically decorated with flowers, Union Jack shields, flags and bubbling fountains and bowls of gold-fish, carping pedestals, tables were beautifully prepared. Overhead a miniature aeroplane circled.

A long list of toasts, following a hearty sing-song and interspersed with musical numbers, gave birth to many splendid speeches delivered by officials of the society. The following toasts were proposed.

One to the health of the Imperial L. O. L. 2767, of Toronto, was responded to by Wor. Bro. James Moore, borough master of the Toronto lodge. "Our Visitors" was proposed by Geo. Copeland with Wor. Bro. W. H. Hartnell of Ingersoll responding.

Quartets of solo and solos comprised the musical entertainment, while the singing of the assembly was led by L. M. Houlden.

A toast to the Orange Association was proposed by Rt. Wor. Bro. Rev. J. A. Robinson, and was responded to by Rt. Wor. Bro. E. T. Essey, K. C., L.L.D., P. G. M. of Ontario West.

Most Wor. Bro. L. C. Hovell, M. P., supreme grand master of British North America, responding to a toast to the grand lodge, made an address, referring to all hearts of Orangemen and Empire Loyalties. He called for the maintenance of that spirit which has written the traditions of the great order in blood to fight the subtle attempts made by the enemies of the British Empire to undo her. "These traitors, many of whom, he said, were protected by the name of British citizenship, were endeavoring to sever the strands which link the Empire together. They were seeking to wean away the friends of Great Britain and to sow sedition in the minds of her subjects."

He told of the attempts which were being made in India, United States, Egypt and Ireland to disintegrate the Empire.

"If it is going on in all these countries it is most certain that the propaganda work is being carried on in Canada," he said, "and we must be promoters of this propaganda work would embroil the whole world in another war to gain the mastery of the world."

Speech is but a weapon in their hands. The Irish want liberty. For what? They want the British Empire to be behind hedges. We fought for liberty against the German hordes. Are we to surrender them to the Sinn Feiners?

"The man who preaches that Canada wishes to be nothing but a vassal state, that she is to be a puppet of the British Empire, is an unvarnished liar. Do you want it, brethren? Shouts of 'No, no!' answered him. The British Empire was being forced to fight against cowards who were afraid to fight in the open, he declared the danger was facing was as great as any of her history."

Grand Lodge Work. He spoke some time on the accomplishments of the grand lodge, and was called for by the members of the lodges. He said the lodge was entering into a new era.

SPEEDING PAST COP BRINGS FINE OF \$5

Youth Denies Using Objectionable Language To Police Officer.

P. C. Sidney Scagell of the local police force did not teltish being consigned to any place alleged to be warmer than London has been during the past few days, so he halted two local youths into police court Tuesday morning. One, Calvin Smith, on a charge of using abusive language, and the other, Ernest Blackwell, on a charge of breaking the motor and vehicle act on the night of September 22.

Calvin Smith was let go with a warning, while Blackwell, the driver of the car, was assessed the usual \$5 and costs.

The police officer said that he attempted to stop the car at King and Richmond streets because the rear stopping the car was driven past him, and while it was passing closely he heard Smith make the objectionable remark.

Smith denied saying it and said that he had not been in police court since spring. Blackwell explained to the magistrate that the car was an old model, with rear lights, which would not stay lit.

The following also paid five dollars each into the coffers of the court for breaches of the motor and vehicle act: L. J. Quick, Hiram Vanlow, C. Dostater, W. T. Taylor, C. H. Schott, J. Werner, E. J. Hill, A. M. Masurel, C. McDonald and Charles Ellis.

E. Harris was charged with speeding, but was let go because the court could not establish the fact that it was his car which had been exceeding the speed limit on Dundas street on September 22, between Eglinton and Eva streets. Mr. Harris claimed that he had been at the Ontario Hospital sports at the time and had his car with him.

Harold McIntosh and Louis Conroe were charged with playing ball on York street on September 22. Because of their good character they were allowed to go with a warning.

The charge against Frank Cahill of this city for the theft of a diamond ring was postponed for one week on the application of the solicitor of the accused. Bail was fixed at \$3,000.

A charge of assault attended with bodily harm was laid against Frank Lewis of 501 Princess avenue by Ida W. Hoskins of 1215 Dundas street. It is alleged that Lewis assaulted the husband of the plaintiff, C. W. Hoskins, on the night of September 13, inflicting injuries. As the injured man was too ill to appear in court, the case was adjourned for one week. Bail was set at \$2,000.
