DEADLY FIGHT WITH INDIANS

Kills Three Savages and Then Is

Dropped by Boy With Rifle.

BATTLE, Mont., Oct. 22.—Game Warden

Henry A. Vass has arrived with the

remains of Deputy Game Warden Chas.

B. Peyton, killed in a fight with In-

dians Sunday in the Swan River Coun-

try while attempting to arrest them

for transgressing the game laws of

the state.

The deputy game warden was shot

by a 15-year-old Indian and was

behind the horses of the Red

Skins and not noticed by Peyton.

When Peyton told the Indians they

were under arrest, one of them grab-

bed the officer by the neck. Peyton

shook him off and advised them to be

peaceful. Another Indian then uttered

a war whoop, pulled his rifle and

about to shoot when Peyton dropped

him in his tracks with a bullet. Two

other Indians attempted to get their

guns unshouldered, but Peyton killed

them before they could get into action.

Rudolph, the sheriff's companion, ob-

served the little Indian kneeling

between the horses aiming at Peyton

and he fired at the Red Skin at the

same time that the latter fired at the

officer. Peyton was mortally shot and

the Indian boy toppled over dead.

The squaws later put Warden Pey-

ton out of his misery, according to Ru-

dolph, ending his sufferings by a half

dozen shots from small calibre guns.

SAVED 100 LIVES.

During Exploit of Three Yankies in

Philippine Storm.

MANILA, Oct. 22.—Additional re-

ports of damage wrought in the Caga-

nary Valley by the typhoon of Oct.

12 indicate that loss of life will reach

500.

At Aparri, where a thrilling rescue

of a hundred natives was effected

thru the heroism of Lieut. Robert

Clark, Lieut. Tredway and Postmaster

Foss, the survivors say that 300

residents of the submerged fishing vil-

lage, which is located some distance

below Aparri, were swept away and

drowned.

The three Americans, aided by one

Filipino volunteer, were informed of

the danger that threatened the vil-

lage and managed to reach it by boat.

Approaching the shore in a series of

short rushes the boatmen, with the

rescuers found scores of natives cling-

ing to the poles of their wrecked

habitations. Clark and Tredway,

carrying lines from the boats, fought

their way thru the breakers and

swinging from house to house saved

the lives of about 100 women and

children. All but six of those living

when the boat reached the village

were saved.

three weeks to three months.

The women were offered the alterna-

tive of giving bonds for their good

behavior, but they elected to go to jail.

singer, has been dead for several

months, members of the Simpson Meth-

odist Episcopal Church, Clermont and

Wilmington-avenues, Brooklyn, will

ing, when from a large phonograph

on the pulpit platform they will listen

to "The Ninety and Nine," and others

of his widely known hymns.

Mr. Sankey spent many of his last

hours singing into a recorder the hymns

which had moved audiences at Moody

and Sankey meetings all over the

world.

Wall Street Securities Irregular, But Many Advances Are Made—No Speculation in Canadians.

All that can be said of the Toronto Stock Market to-day is that prices were generally steady and firm in a few instances. At best the market was fearfully narrow and although quotations of many issues appear firm, it is due more to inside support than to actual outside demand. No one is entering the market at present from a speculative idea and the few public purchases made are essentially for investment. Twin City is being bought in this way, but otherwise the speculative securities were left to the handling of inside brokers. The actual investment stocks were firm, but the demand was light.

Earnings reported for the second week of October by three southern railroads to-day show up relatively quite as unfavorable as the average weekly earnings since the first of the fiscal year. Alabama Great Southern gross fell off 17 per cent. for the second week, Georgia, Southern & Florida gross fell off 13 per cent. for the second week, as compared to 17 per cent. for the longer period.

NEW ORLEANS: Orders for \$2,000,000 worth of new car equipment have been placed by the Morgan Lines of Louisiana and Texas Railroad and Navigation Co., according to Thorvald Fay, manager. The new equipment will include 1800 freight and 10 passenger cars. The St. Paul Railroad has placed contracts for building 50 locomotives.
