The East End Silver Mountain property is one of the largest mining properties in Algoma. It consists of 1,300 acres and is blessed with all the natural advantages to be desired. Inside the area of this property and situated not more than 200 feet from the mine, are the Dunais and Lizard Lakes. They are at least 150 feet above the level of the mine, and will give an excellent supply of water to run a stamp mill.
