MUST GIVE FAMILY NAMES.

New York, Oct. 22.—Pugilists competing in this state will not be permitted to adopt the names of men whose reputations already have been gained in the ring, under a new rule adopted by the State Athletic Commission.

I know of no business organization that so completely narrows the new time in which we live as the United Drug Company.

MAXIM'S 'PHONE GIRL KILLED BY TEN STORY FALL

New York, Oct. 22.—The body of Anna Lancy, aged twenty-five, a telephone operator in Maxim's Restaurant, was found clung in a night-dress in the courtyard of the Paterno apartment house, 440 Riverside drive, near 116th street. The young woman fell or jumped from the 10th floor, where she occupied an apartment with Miss May Flanagan.

The body was found by night engineer Joseph Aumt. A Knickerbocker Hospital surgeon said the young woman had been killed instantly. Tenants in the fashionable apartment house were aroused, but it was some time before the body was identified.

Miss Flanagan said a birthday party was given in her apartment and that three men and one girl were guests. She said she and Miss Lancy retired about 2 a. m. She said Miss Lancy's brother John, to whom she was greatly attached, is seriously ill in a Long Island hospital.
