

SPEAKER TELLS OF EXPULSION OF ACADIANS

Judge Arsenault, of P. E. I., Heard in Address at St. Peter's Hall.

St. Peter's Auditorium was filled last night to hear a scholarly lecture by Justice A. E. Arsenault, of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island, on the "Expulsion of the Acadians."

The total number at the time of the expulsion, about 2,500, was divided into three settlements at Chignecto, Grand Pré and Fort Royal. The parting he described as very pathetic.

Justice Arsenault quoted authorities to prove that it was the belief that they were expelled but rather that of the Government of Nova Scotia, whom he described as a cruel man seeking his own personal advancement.

COMMUNITY SPIRIT

The community spirit of the Acadian settlers was enhanced, upon the whole, by the fact that many were holding responsible positions in the legal, business and professional fields at the present time.

At the conclusion of the lecture a vote of thanks was moved by Judge H. O. McInerney, seconded by Mrs. William Harrington, president of the North End sub-division of the Catholic Women's League.


TWO BATHURST MEN WILL BE ORDAINED

FINAL SERMON IN COURSE AT ST. ANDREW'S GIVEN

Rev. J. S. Bonnell Speaks on Subject of "My Religion."

In the fourth and final sermon in the special series of evening addresses, Rev. J. S. Bonnell spoke last night in St. Andrew's church before a congregation that taxed the capacity of the edifice. His subject was "My Religion," and his texts were, first, 4th Mark, "Why are ye so fearful. How is it that ye have not yet faith?" and second, 10th John, "No man can pluck them out of my Father's hand."

Mr. Bonnell stated that these explanations fell short of the truth. What Jesus wished to teach them was that they should have a faith that would hold good no matter what happened, even supposing the ship should sink, no evil could touch them.

Mr. Bonnell based his sermon on the incident of the stilling of the storm on the Sea of Galilee by Jesus and the expression of His disappointment in the lack of faith on the part of the disciples. Mr. Bonnell pointed out that this story was commonly interpreted that the disciples should not have been on board the boat, or that if they had faith in God they would have known that He would not allow the ship to sink.

He is survived by his father, step-mother, two brothers and two half-brothers.
