CANADIAN FOOD AT LONDON FEAST

Col. Amery Sees Great Field For Increase in Canada-British Trade.

LONDON, Oct. 23—Under the chairmanship of Hon. Peter C. Larkin, High Commissioner for Canada, in London, dinner was arranged here last night by W. A. Wilson, agricultural products representative for Canada in Britain, at which practically all the good things on the table came from the Dominion. The guests comprised the leading importers of Britain and others prominent in supplying the United Kingdom with foodstuffs. "Nature always intended Canada to devote a small part of her energies to the production of foodstuffs," declared Col. L. C. Amery, secretary of the Dominions. "There is an immense field for increasing the purchases by Britain for Canada. I have never concealed my own conviction that the most effective way of securing this was by giving preference to the Dominions, but in these matters, we have to deal with economic theories, which in some directions, amount to a religion." Mr. Amery added that much could be done without legislation by having better organization and more effective publicity.

FIRE IS RAGING IN N. Y. SHIPYARDS

Fire Boat and Staten Island Apparatus Called to Shooter's Island.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23—The fire boat Gopher Mills and three engine companies from Staten Island were called to Shooter's Island in the harbor today to combat a fire in the Standard Shipbuilding Corporation yards. Four hundred feet of marine ways had been reported burned at 11 o'clock. The fire started early this morning and defied the efforts of the few persons near at hand. The shipyards have been inactive for some time.






