hall. He did not remember the exact wording of the two letters but he knew what they meant. Dr. Baxter pressed the witness hard but he persisted in his original statement.

Miss Anderson reported that she had not been able to find in her notes anything further relating to the Nevess case.

Mr. Jones submitted minutes of the City Council about the Harris case, which City Clerk Chestnut had been asked in the morning to have transcribed. Mr. Jones read them to the jury. They showed that on Dec. 6, 1923, a letter claiming \$200 damages was received from Mrs. Harris, and it was referred to the city solicitor. A later minute showed that on Jan. 4, 1924, it was moved no action be taken. In February it was noted that the claim was again up and submitted to the city solicitor. Later he advised that no action be taken. The matter came up again several times, until June, 1924, when the solicitor advised that the case be settled.

saw no ground for granting the appeal and was constrained to refuse. Gregory Bridges Testifies.

Gregory Bridges was then called and examined by Dr. Baxter. He said he was in Mr. Hanson's office in November. He was in the law library in November and heard a conversation between Mr. Hanson and Dr. Allen. Witness described where he was and where the others were in the library. It was easy to hear conversation there. They were talking about an alteration in a document. Witness did not know what document, but he heard Mr. Hanson say, excitedly:

"I did not do anything of the sort. I never did anything of the sort."

Then Dr. Allen said:

"Well, all I can say is I made the alteration as a result of a telephone message from someone in your office. I could not say it was from you personally."

To Mr. Jones witness said this was the substance of what Dr. Allen said. He would not say they were the exact words, but that was the substance. He remembered the impression made upon his mind. To Mr. Jones he repeated the conversation and a little later did so again, being pressed by counsel as to his memory of the incident. Witness said he told Mr. Hanson about hearing this conversation. That was after The Gleaner article appeared. It was before this he had been in Mr. Hanson's office. He had a busy recollection that there was some conversation between Mr. Hanson and Dr. Dougherty in the office about some letter from Mr. Justice White but he had no recollection of conversation about the Nevess case. Witness explained how he came to be in the library and how his attention was attracted by Mr. Hanson's excited voice, and he could not help hearing what was said. Mr. Hanson asked him after The Gleaner article appeared to write down the substance of what he had heard and he did so, and gave it to Mr. Hanson. There were no other persons in the library at the time he heard the assertion of Mr. Hanson and Dr. Allen's reply. He was then in Mr. Hanson's office. Witness said he knew Dr. Allen was a man of standing in the community. He could not say how long the two had been talking in the library. He could not swear the conversation related to the Nevess matter. It might have related to some other document. Witness did not see The Gleaner article of Dec. 17. He did not hear the matter talked over by lawyers or other persons.

This concluded the examination of Mr. Bridges and court adjourned until Tuesday afternoon at half-past two.

**HON. WM. PUGSLEY 74 YEARS OLD TODAY**

Sends Optimistic Message on Future of the Maritime Provinces.

In reply to a request sent by The Telegraph-Journal to Hon. Dr. William Pugsley, Dominion commissioner for hearing reparations claims, for a message on the occasion of his birthday, the following has been received from Charlottetown, P. E. I., Sept. 26—

Accept my thanks for your kind telegram and request for a message for my seventy-fourth birthday. First of all I desire to take this opportunity of extending my sincere thanks for its kind and most sincere sympathy with myself and family during my long and critical illness which began about a year ago and on to a letter, and happier state, yet it is a glorious thing to be well and strong again, and to be able to talk in part in a measure whether it be large or small, in promoting the welfare of the community in which I have spent so many happy years, and that of my province, which is the peer of any of the provinces of Canada.

In the discharge of my present duties I have had occasion to see more of the Maritime Provinces than ever before, and I am convinced that no where in the world is there better opportunity for living comfortable and happy lives. The people of these provinces have, it is true, grievances which are great and burdensome. But they can, must, and I am firmly convinced, will be remedied. They had their origin for the most part in the free hand which in 1915 was given to the Canadian National Railway board to violate previous parliamentary compacts, and to ignore that grand Canadian ideal prevailing of carrying Canadian traffic over Canadian railroads and through Canadian ports. This pernicious course seems, I am sorry to say, to have been continued by the present board. Public faith has not been kept with the Maritime Provinces, and the keeping of public faith is essential to the creation of a truly national spirit and unity between all sections of the Dominion. But while earnestly pressing for the keeping of public faith with the Maritime Provinces, we must cheerfully apply the same principle to all other sections of Canada. I am happy to be able to say that in the tone of the speeches of influential public men there is strong evidence of the development of a broader national spirit, and of a deeper and more just appreciation of the grievances of the Maritime Provinces as well as of a determination to have them removed. I have every confidence that this happy result will soon be achieved.
