Manila, Jan. 24.—One constabulary soldier and two fanatics were silled in a clash on Bugas Island, off the coast of Mindanao, where members of the religious Society of Colorum have been causing trouble, according to advices here from Surigao.

The town of Socorro, where fanatics have entrenched themselves, has been burned by Colonel Bowers, constabulary commander of Surigao, who believes that its destruction will result in collapse of the uprising.

Colonel Bowers, who recently asked for reinforcements in measures to pacify the fanatics after they had killed 19 constabulary soldiers and lost 80 of their own number, telegraphed today that he landed at Socorro with 100 men, that he landed at Socorro with 100 men, the gunboat Sacramento.
