



The Journal points out that the worst part of the lie is not that which debits Great Britain with \$11,000,000,-000, the total American credit to for-eign nations, while the true British debt is only \$4,500,000,000, but the in-ference that Great Britain is spending money on increased armaments. Discussing the fact that the British armament figures for the year must in-clude the cost of military operations admit-tedly saved the whole world from the Turk, the Journal goes on to say:

"In the British fiscal year ended March 31, 1918, before the close of the war, the British expenditures on army, navy and air forces were £2,402,800,000. In the follow-ing year, 1919, including four months after the armistice, the figures were only slightly lower, at £2,198,000,000. Then the big reduc-tion began. On March 31, 1920, the total was £604,028,000. On March 81, 1921, at the end of the fiscal year, it was more than cut in half at £202,228,000. On March 31 of


