LUMBER TRADE REVIEW.

Soft Wood Market, Is Very Brisk. The American lumberman says soft wood lumber market is very brisk and hardwoods also improve. Demand for softwoods is so keen that market may almost be termed a runaway one. Prices are mounting rapidly, particularly for southern pine. Building continues to expand and industrials call for more and more material with result that stocks are materially reduced. Most recent statistics show that so far this year orders have exceeded production by thirteen per cent, but for last week by twenty-six per cent. Ever since the first of March orders have been materially greater than production. Number of manufacturers are temporiarly out of market, and it is difficult to place orders for a future delivery.
