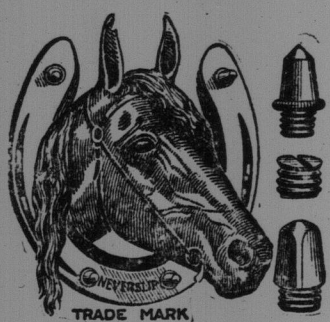

### LOCAL NEWS

#### MILITARY.

Lieutenant-Colonel H. C. Sparling, general staff officer of Military District No. 7, is in Sackville on business in connection with the duties of his office.

#### BURIED TODAY.

The funeral of Louis LeBrack took place this afternoon from his late residence, 50 Clarence street. Service was conducted by Rev. James Crisp, and interment took place in the Methodist burying ground.

#### SCARLET FEVER CASES.

Several houses in the city are quarantined with scarlet fever signs, and some cases are still being reported, yet the situation, it is reported, has not assumed anything like the form of an epidemic, while the cases reported are of a very mild type.

#### ST. DUNSTON'S CHURCH.

A Fredericton despatch says that St. Dunstan's Catholic parish, which comprises the city of Fredericton, contributed more money in proportion to population than any parish of the diocese of St. John last year. The financial statement was issued on Sunday.

#### WHIST AND DANCE.

The ladies' auxiliary of the A. O. H. held a very successful whist and dance in their rooms in Union street last night. The prize winners were Mrs. Blanch Flaherty, Miss Veronica Floyd, and Daniel Lunnay and Louis McCarty. A very pleasant whist party was given last evening at the home of Mrs. Bert Pearson, 156 Queen street. After cards, music and dancing were enjoyed and refreshments served. The prize winners were: First, Mrs. Aubrey S. Pearson; second, Miss Sproul.

## QUICK WORK AT THE GRAMPIAN

Due to the erection of the commodious baggage room at St. John's C. P. R. is now able to make records at this port in the quick dispatch of passengers. When the C. P. O. S. liner Grampian arrived last night at 10.10 o'clock, everything was ready for the disembarkation of the Chinese in twenty minutes and at 11.45 o'clock the first train load were en route to the Pacific coast. At 1.45 o'clock the second was away. The party consisted of four imperial officers and seven other ranks and 1,000 Chinese. During the time elapsing after landing until they left on the special trains, they had to be checked off, manifests made out, six copies to a man, and many other details attended to. In addition every one was furnished with a military blanket provided by the Canadian militia, which were done up in neat packages. Colonel Napier, assistant chief provost marshal of Canada. They were also given two apples by Miss Denison, daughter of Senator Dennis of the Halifax Herald, and Mrs. Dobson, also of Halifax.

In addition to the Chinese on board there were 250 cabin passengers who left this morning on a special train for Montreal and points west. This is the first batch of Chinese brought to this port. The coolies were employed at Noyelle and Dieppe. During the voyage here the Grampian encountered very rough weather, and as a result was delayed. Nothing eventful occurred on the voyage.

## TWELVE BELOW IN CITY TODAY

Those who were in hopes that the cold weather would abate during the night, were disappointed when they went out this morning and found the mercury down to twelve degrees below zero. During the morning it became a big warmer, and at noon the thermometer registered five degrees below. The cold was very penetrating, as a light wind was blowing. In the evening it was twenty-two below this morning.

### POLICE COURT

There was one in the prisoner's dock this morning to greet the magistrate. On several occasions this year the words "no sheet" have been repeated. Several postponed cases were taken up.

A charge against Dr. F. X. Morris, charged with procuring abortion, was again read over. The accused was brought into court and his counsel, Scott E. Morrell, asked for him, but this was refused, and the accused was remanded until tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock, when the case will be heard at the Maternity Home. E. S. Ritchie is acting for the woman complainant.

A case against Thomas Grant, charged with stealing moccasins from the store of Max Shecter, Will street, was resumed. The accused told of meeting a friend, who was under the influence of liquor on December 22, 1919, and said they both went to the store in question, where the accused's friend wanted to see some clothes. While the negotiations were taking place he said he was looking at some moccasins. A man came to the store and opened the door, but did not come in, as the accused went to shut the door the complainant grabbed him and said, "where are you going with the moccasins?" and he said he pushed him out of the door before an explanation could be given.

The magistrate sent the accused up for trial. A case against Louis Carey, charged with misappropriating \$860, the property of Sidney Kerr and others, was again postponed until this afternoon at 2.30. Scott E. Morrell appeared for the plainiffs and W. M. Ryan for the defence. A case against George Drew, on suspicion of breaking and entering and stealing from the store of Sidney Isaacs, Mill street, was postponed until the condition of Mr. Isaacs, who is ill in the infirmary, permits. It is probable that it will be taken up tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock. J. A. Barry appeared for the defence.

**YARMOUTH AND LIQUOR CARGO TOWED.** New York, Jan. 20.—The freighter Yarmouth, dislodged off Cape May, N. J., during a storm, was towed into the lower bay last night with her \$2,000,000 of liquor.

## MORE THAN \$40,000 OF 1919 ASSESSMENT WAS NOT COLLECTED

This Amount Will Now Be Included in the 1920 Taxes

Weekly Council Meeting This Morning — City Market Stalls Rented at Increase — The Matter of City Wages.

A section referring to the continuation of bonuses for the present year was struck out, as it was considered unnecessary. A recommendation to place on file the reports of the city and street engineers and the commissioner of public works with regard to the pavement of Brussels street was adopted.

A letter from the St. John Arboricultural Society asking for the usual grant of \$300, \$52.50, \$75.00, \$113.50, \$34.13, \$44.95, \$65.63, \$99.32 was read. The matter was referred to the committee of public safety.

A letter from the publishers of the Agricultural Gazette came with a copy of a recent number which contained an article regarding city markets. The publishers asked for information with regard to the milk supply in the city and also for a copy of any milk by-laws in force. The matter was referred to the committee of public safety.

Commissioner Fisher brought in a resolution that the commissioners be authorized in their discretion to pay the new rates outlined in a schedule submitted by the Civic Public Service Employees' Union, dating back to Jan. 7. It was decided to let the matter stand for the present, as Commissioner Jones was not prepared to support the move without further consideration. It was pointed out that the adjustment could be made at the next pay day.

A petition was read from the Women's Institute asking the city to ask the mayor to request the collection of household garbage. The matter was referred to the committee. The mayor said that he was opposed to this action.

**THE TAXES.** The mayor read a report made by the chamberlain for the information of the council with regard to the collection of last year's taxes. The report showed there was a shortage of \$40,873.50 in collection. The mayor explained that this was made up for the great part of amounts related to several firms and individuals whose appeals had been continued. He said that the amount was less than he had expected and that it was due to the introduction of the new act. He was of the opinion that the loss to the city for the delay in collection would amount to about \$1,200 in interest, etc. He was confident that, now that the working of the act had been demonstrated, so great a discrepancy would not occur again.

In reply to Commissioner Bullock the mayor said that this amount would have to be paid to the assessment for the present year and would therefore increase the rate.

### EX-SOLDIER'S AND THE KHAKI

The garrison military police of this district have received instructions to warn all men who have left the army over thirty days immediately to discontinue wearing khaki with brass buttons. Quite a number of men have already been warned to change the buttons and in most cases the order has been carried out. In future if these instructions are not complied with prosecutions before the city magistrate will follow.

### OTTAWA MAN CHARGED WITH KILLING MOTHER.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—(By Canadian Press)—William Lennox, charged with the murder of his mother, Mrs. Margaret Lennox, 895, Wellington avenue, on June 10, 1919, will stand trial on Wednesday. A true bill was returned by the grand jury today.
