NEW HIP YOKE EFFECT.
The demand for separate skirts is as great as ever. One of the newest models is shown here, having for its distinguishing feature a hip yoke that extends down the back in a box-pleated panel effect. The lower edges of the front may be finished in round or square outline. To make the skirt requires 4 1/2 yards of 44-inch or 3 1/2 yards of 54-inch material. The foundation is a three-piece affair, lengthened by a two-piece lower part. The tunic has six gores.

Join lower skirt sections as notched. Pleat, creasing on slot perforations; bring folded edge to small "o" perforations and press. Turn under lower edge 5 inches for hem. Sew to lower edge of foundation gores as notched.

Now pleat tunic as indicated and stitch. Turn under edge of front gore on slot perforations; lap to small "o" perforations in side gore, notches even; stitch as illustrated; close seam underneath and press. Turn hem at front edges of front gore and yoke at notches. Sew yokes and back gore to front and side gores, notches and center-fronts even. If square yoke is made lap on front gore to small "o" perforations, centers even. Lap right front on left, centers even; stitch, leaving edges free above single large "O" perforation in front gore for opening. Close center-back seam. Form inverted pleat at center-back, creasing on slot perforations; bring folded edge to center-back seam; stitch as illustrated and press. Arrange on foundation, centers even; stitch upper edges together.

Save the Crumbs

Save the crumbs and the leaves will take care of themselves.
There's a new twist to an old adage, and the housekeeper who throws away in crumbs almost half the bread she buys or bakes may find it worthy of her consideration—she'll find it much more profitable and much more agreeable to study the crumbs and their usefulness, than to worry about her grocery bill.

But there's one thing to be remembered in saving crumbs and pieces of bread, never save moldy bread. Crumbs may be stale, but they must not be moldy or else they are neither healthful or palatable.

After the crumbs, or the small bits have been gathered from the table or from the bread box they should be placed in a warm oven to dry. They must not be baked or toasted, just dried. When the bread is crisp roll it with a rolling pin and sift through a fine sieve and then put the crumbs away in an air-tight can.

There are dozens of ways in which bread crumbs may be used in puddings and croquettes and in sauces, but some of the ways I have tested in my own kitchen and found good are given here. Give them a trial, I am sure you will find them good, and I know you will find them a great aid to economy in the kitchen.

Many Good Uses for Crumbs of Bread
Use bread crumbs to remove wax from silk: Toast a piece of soft bread until very hot, but not burned, and rub spot with hot bread until cold. Then reheat or use another piece of bread. Continue until the wax is removed. Afterwards rub the spot with dry crumbs until perfectly clean.

If candles drip upon a lacquered holder it is almost impossible to remove the wax without injury to the holder. Dip a piece of cotton into a little oil, then into the finest bread crumbs. Carefully rub the spot until the wax is removed.

If the bindings of books need to be cleaned and freshened rub with fine crumbs in a woolen bag. This will also freshen the soiled leaves of the books.

To clean fine laces stretch the lace carefully on an ironing board, fasten the edges with pins. Sprinkle the lace with fine bread crumbs, rub them over the lace with a soft cloth. Constantly using fresh crumbs and changing cloth as it becomes soiled.

To clean gold or silver lace stretch the lace and baste it on a woolen cloth, taking great care to follow the outline. Pack the woolen cloth onto board, stretch well. Brush the lace free from dust. Mix fine crumbs with laundry blue in parts one of blue to three of crumbs. Sprinkle over lace, rub gently with woolen cloth until clean. Many times rubbing lightly is better than trying to clean and polish with one application.

Clean chandeliers with soft brush dipped in coal oil and then in dry crumbs. Rub lightly. If chandelier is spotted by flies use onion juice in place of oil.

Crumb and Marrow Balls
When buying soup, bone have the butcher split it. Take out the marrow and season highly with pepper, a dash of nutmeg and salt. Stir in enough fine bread crumbs to mould mixture into balls. Set away to cool and dry. Drop into boiling soup and boil two minutes. Serve hot.

Baked Rarebit
Butter a pie pan, spread a thin layer of bread crumbs on the bottom. Season with paprika, a little salt and a thin layer of grated cheese. Add another layer of crumbs, and cheese until pan is filled. Dot top with butter and turn over one cup of milk into which has been beaten one egg. Bake in quick oven 15 minutes. Cut in pie shape pieces and serve.

BRITISH LOSSES HEAVY AT BATTLE OF THE YSER
London, Nov. 6.—It is admitted at the War Office that the British troops had suffered heavy losses in the battle of the Yser, probably heavier than those of the French and Belgians. The Belgian troops are said to have lost between 12,000 and 18,000 men.

The great losses of the British are said to be due to the fact that the Germans concentrated their artillery fire on the English troops whenever possible. It is believed that the British had half a million Germans opposed to them in the Yser fighting.
