HALL CAINE TO HAMPSTEAD HEATH

Manxman Pays \$50,000 For Plot For Home

LITERARY FOLK

New Laureate Low on List of Newspaper's Popular Vote, While Kipling is at Top—Dr. Bridges Not Widely Known

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, July 21.—That picturesque and proverbially "snappy" suburb of London, Hampstead, has just lost its most distinguished literary man in the person of H. G. Wells, who has left Shelly's old street, Chiswick, and moved down to the West End, but it is about to gain another in the person of Hall Caine, Hampstead's famous "hearth" novelist, who has just purchased a plot of land in the suburb which is the favorite holiday-making ground of London's "Aristocrats" and "Arriettes," has it seems, made a conquest of the Manxman, who now declares that he can write nowhere else.

For this statement, which doubtless will be read with grief mixed with incredulity in the Isle of Man, I have the authority of no one else than Mrs. Hall Caine. She and her husband have had for several years a beautiful house in Avenue road, St. John's Woods—a street that numbers several other celebrities, Martin Harvey, an actor, for one, among its residents,—but Mrs. Caine told a woman friend of mine the other day, that they were giving it up. The friend expressed surprise, knowing that the house, besides being an uncommonly fine one, possessed a lovely garden, but Mrs. Caine declared that her husband found it impossible now to write except on Hampstead Heath, adding that they were going to build a house for themselves up there, and that they already had bought a piece of land for which they had paid \$50,000.

Of course a sum like that is a mere flea bite to the Manxman, who has just made a new American contract for good news knows how many years and how many thousands of dollars, and who has just written the successor to "The Woman Thou Gavest Me," surrounded by gaping costs. The rubber-necking that evidently drove Rudyard Kipling away from Rotting Dean would be nothing to H. G. Wells is on the war path again. This time his quarry is the London "Globe" which is one of the oldest and most reputable of English newspapers. Wells is a member of the Gipsy Club, and evidently a report reaching the "Globe" to the effect that he meant to go "on tramp" for a bit for the sake of proving that even a man "steeped in city life" may gain a living on the road. The "Globe" printed a highly complimentary little paragraph on the subject to the effect that he meant to go "on tramp" to waste his experience. "He has shown in his works of fiction a remarkable power of getting 'inside the skin of a character,'" the newspaper added, "and we shall look forward with the greatest interest to a novel of his which is now in the press."

Now the "Globe" has received a characteristically virilic message from Wells written on a postcard, denouncing the little paragraph as "an entirely unjustifiable libel." Wells is a member of the Gipsy Club, and the "Globe" apologizes humbly, doubtless with its tongue in its cheek. A few weeks ago I read a red mark, approvals of the now-healed breach between Wells and Shaw that the former could be made terribly wroth by extremely little. This is a case in point.

The New Post Laureate

It would be rather interesting to know exactly how many Englishmen ever had heard of their new poet laureate before Dr. Robert Bridges' name began to be mentioned in connection with that post. About as many as have not heard of Rudyard Kipling, one would imagine. The comparative popularity of the two writers has just been well illustrated by the result of a "referendum" organized among its readers by a London weekly

to decide who should be laureate. Kipling topped the poll with 22,080 votes, while Dr. Bridges came eighth on the list with 710 votes, or exactly two per cent of those cast. The seven poets whose popularity with these readers eclipsed the official laureate were Mrs. Meynell, who came second with 6,996 votes; John Masefield, who was third with 3,297; Thomas Hardy, who got 2,170; William Watson, who secured 1,689; Henry Newbolt, who had 912 and G. K. Chesterton, who actually polled 777 votes. Of course Kipling ought to have had the laureateship; equally, of course, he would have had it had a Liberal administration not been in office, whereas he is a dried-in-the-wood Tory.

Meanwhile another test of the comparative popularity of the two writers occurred to me. I have turned up both the two best known dictionaries of quotations—"Barlett" and "Benham," and neither of them seems ever to have heard of the new laureate. The most recent of these volumes gives thirty-one pages from Kipling, sixty-seven from William Watson, twelve from Henry Newbolt, and thirteen from Thomas Hardy.

It proves to be nearly two years and seems even longer, since 1899 we had a new novel from William Morgan, the veteran author of "Joseph Vandy" and "Alice-for-Short." His last romance was "A Likely Story," and as it struck me that Mr. Morgan's big army of admirers must be wondering when another book was to be forthcoming, I wrote and asked if I might promise another from his pen? Here is his terse and characteristic reply:

"Yes, by all means predict a novel by me. Time unisexed and title unknown—author and publisher are the only points arranged—and some 800 pages of text"

Daily Hints For the Cook

PEACH CUSTARD

Fill sautéed glasses about a quarter full of chopped peach and then neatly to the top with soft custard. When ready to serve cool each portion with sweetened whipped cream and invert half of a chilled peach in the centre.

CREAM OF CAULIFLOWER.

Trim off the outside leaves and stalk, place the cauliflower in cold salted water and let stand one hour. Drain, cook in boiling salted water until tender and press through a ricer. Cook three table-spoons of bubbling hot butter, stir in gradually three cups of milk scalded, with one-half a small onion and a chill pepper, add one beaten egg mixed with one cup of hot cream, season with pepper and salt and strain over the prepared cauliflower.

BULGARIA FACES HEAVY DEMANDS

London, Aug. 1.—The allies in their demands presented to the peace conference today, proposed the establishment of a frontier standing east from the Struma river, running midway through Rumelia, and reaching the Aegean Sea, sixteen miles west of Dedagatanb. This would leave Bulgaria a coast line on the Aegean Sea of less than thirty miles. If these drastic terms are accepted Bulgaria will issue from two wars a little larger than when she entered into them, but she will have to abandon a large amount of territory to Roumania. In addition, the allies maintain their demand for an indemnity.

It is probable that the negotiations will be protracted and that the armistice of five days will be renewed. No objection is likely to be raised to its renewal, for it seems evident that both the Serbians and the Greeks have fought themselves to a standstill.

A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Belgrade asserts that the casualties of the Serbian army in the past month of fighting aggregate nearly 35,000.
