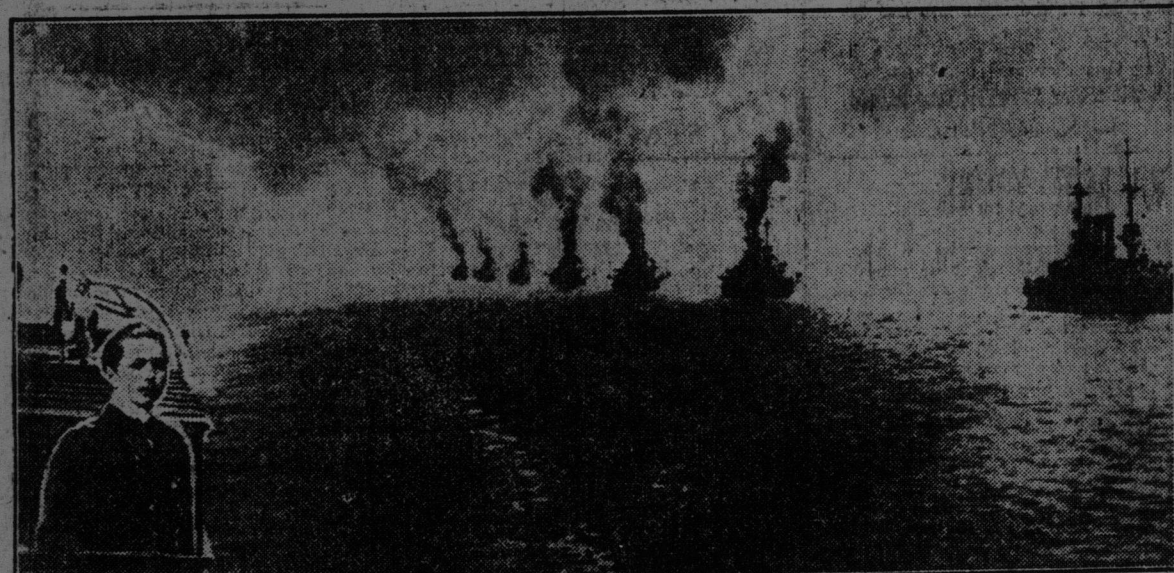

New York, Feb. 15.—Charles W. Morse, who, with his wife and a trained nurse, left on the liner Kaiserin Augusta Victoria yesterday for Mediterranean ports, believes that the sunshine of the Riviera and the waters of Bad Nauheim will return him to his country in improved health.

Mr. Morse escaped publicity by boarding the steamship at nightfall. He was not accompanied by his physician, Dr. A. L. Fowler, who traveled with the banker to this city from Atlanta. On the trip over Mr. Morse will be under the care of the ship's surgeon.

Doctor Fowler says that while Mr. Morse was suffering from Bright's disease and a heart disorder, he has shown much improvement since his return to this city.

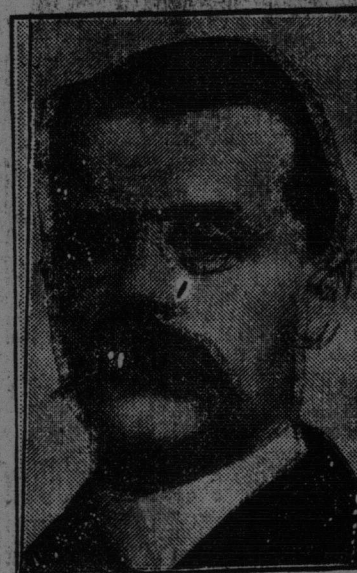
