**STONE CHURCH MEN.**

**TAKE ONLY PART OF IT.**  
Objections having been raised by the city authorities to the moving of Ald. Likely's wooden building through the streets, from its present position in Main street to the new mill site at the March Creek, the idea has been abandoned. A small part of the structure will, however, be moved intact, as it is felt by Councilor Johnston that this could be done quite readily. The section to be moved is that used by Ald. Likely as an office. The other portion will be torn down. It will be moved at night, on either runners of wheels, as occasion may demand.

**WILL OF H. A. AUSTIN.**  
In the probate court today, the will of Henry A. Austin, insurance agent, was presented by the widow, Amelia R. Austin, who is named therein as executrix, with her petition to obtain proof of it. The will was executed in Winnipeg in 1888 and leaves all the estate to the wife absolutely. It is witnessed by James Clinkhill, Thomas Baird Taylor. The whereabouts of the latter is unknown; the former has moved to Saskatoon, and a commission is now being taken to locate the latter place, barrister-at-law, to take the proof of the execution of the will. There is no real estate, personal estate, \$200; life insurance about \$2,000. Clarence H. Ferguson, is proctor.

**MAJOR B. E. ARMSTRONG.**  
It has been rumored in militia circles that St. John would have an officer in the coronation contingent, in addition to the commandant, Col. H. H. McLean, and the name of Major B. E. Armstrong has been mentioned as the one who is likely to be chosen. No official word has yet been received. Major Armstrong is looked upon as an officer who would fairly be entitled to the honor, as he has seen active service in South Africa and suffered the loss of a foot during the war. Representatives from the local regiments on the contingent have not yet been chosen.

## ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOR THE SUBURBANITES

Street Railway Company's Plan is to Furnish Light in Rothersey

If a bill prepared for the legislature by the St. John Railway Company is sanctioned, residents of Rothersey and intermediate points between this city and the fashionable suburban village of Kings county, will be enabled to light their houses by electricity, and to obtain electrical power from the plant in this city. The bill asks for authority to extend the street railway power lines into the county of Kings. Col. McLean, vice-president of the company, said this morning that it was proposed to run their light and power lines as far as Rothersey, and that current would be supplied to anyone who wanted it along the line. It would not be surprising therefor, to see soon, if the bill goes through, all the suburban cottages lighted by electricity.

## SUCCESS IN WEST

Harold Carpenter of St. John Now Owns a Ranch and Meat Market

Since going west from this city a few years ago, Harold Carpenter, son of James T. Carpenter, meat dealer, of Mill street, has met with remarkable success, and is now the owner of a fine cattle ranch, a meat market, besides being agent for several milling companies. His latest achievement is to have been elected a councillor for the town of Osage, Sask., with a large majority. It is in this town that Mr. Carpenter conducts the greatest part of his business, in which he has been very successful for the last four years.

## CITY HALL GIVES BEST ARGUMENTS FOR COMMISSION

This Week's Board Meetings Show Shining Examples of Incompetency

What of North End City Building Sale as a Business Proposition? The Paving and the Marble Cove Sewer Matter—Will They Shelve Investigation Recently Ordered?

—If any more arguments are needed to show that the commission form of government is needed in St. John, the aldermen have furnished them this week in the board meetings that have been held. At the safety board it was decided to recommend that the city building in the north end be sold to Dr. Maher for \$3,400. At the present time this building is bringing the city a rental of \$235 a year, or nearly ten per cent on that valuation. If \$3,400 is accepted, what will be done with the money? If it is put in the bank it will draw three per cent interest, or \$102 a year, as compared with \$235, a direct loss of \$223 a year to the city. Is that the way business men would act?

The board of works decided after a lengthy discussion over the specifications for permanent pavement, to allow the engineer to exercise the same power as had last year when he recommended the acceptance of the Hesse Company's tender and sewer, when under oath before the investigating committee, he admitted that at the time he made the recommendation, he knew nothing about the Hessean method. What is the use of drawing up specifications when the engineer is going to be allowed to accept any other method, whether he knows what it is or not? Yet the aldermen calmly assent to conditions which may result in the same unsatisfactory state of affairs as was experienced last year.

## ANOTHER TROUBLE IN THE MARKET

Countrymen Met With Demand For \$5 as License Fee—They Decline and Get Legal Advice

The market by-laws caused some more confusion this morning in the country market, when several farmers came to the city with produce to place on sale, but to their surprise their goods were seized by the market clerk, W. C. Dunham, and although they had paid their fees, they were not allowed to sell unless they paid a license of \$5. To this the countrymen raised strenuous objections. Some of them had been selling different times in the market, and had never been asked to pay license fees, in addition to the other payments.

## THE STAR LINE

Sale Promises to See Lively Bidding—Some Names Are Heard

Some lively bidding is promised at the forthcoming sale of the Star Line Steamship Company on March 11. The names of several prospective purchasers have already been mentioned, among them being W. Wentworth Roberts and others, David Coy, proprietor of the Lorne Hotel, Indian town, who also has a number interested with him; The Bridges Tow Boat Company of Gagetown, and Messrs. Topley Bros., and it was said today that the St. John River Steamship Company, owners of the Elaine and Hamptstead, may also make an offer.

It is understood that there will be a meeting of the directors of the latter company previous to the sale, and that then a decision will be arrived at. A member of the company said that, should they acquire the line they would run the Victoria on the Fredericton route with the Elaine and the Majestic on the lower river route. In any event he said that the Elaine would run as usual on the Fredericton route, and the Hamptstead on the Gagetown route. Both boats will undergo an overhauling and painting and would be in first class shape for the summer business.
