

FEW CHANGES IN TRADING IN MONTREAL LIST

Brazilian, Again Leader,
Gains and Then Loses
a Fraction

PRICES ARE FIRM AT
WALL STREET OPENING

Operations on Long Side Re-
sumed in Face of Ton-
nage Reports

MONTREAL, June 11.—There were only a few fractional price variations during the early trading on the local stock market this morning. Brazilian, yesterday's leader in activity, was again the most prominent issue, opening 1-8 up at 561-8, later losing the fraction. Asbestos pfd. and B. C. Fish each eased 1/4 to 106-3-4 and 89 respectively, while Canada Car pfd. was down 1/4 at 88. Fractional advances were recorded by Quebec Power up 1/4 to 100, and by Abitibi, up 1-8 to 71. Asbestos common, in a small lot, was stronger by 1/4 at 78 1/2. The balance of the list was unchanged, Power selling at 190 1/2, Steel 83-4, Shawinigan 150, Becco first pfd. 28, and Royal Bank 628-3-4.

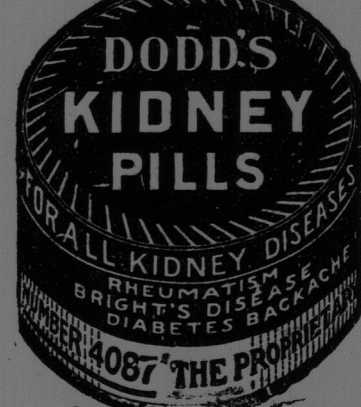
NEW YORK, June 11.—Stock prices displayed a firm tone at the opening of today's market. Stability of the Steel shares in the face of an unexpectedly large decrease in the May unfilled tonnage of the United States Steel Corporation, and the declaration of several extra dividends, encouraged a resumption of operations on the long side. Havana Electric opened 3/4 points higher, and Maxwell Motors B. certificates and American Foreign Power showed initial gains of 1 1/2 and 1 1/4 points respectively.

New Orleans Texas and Mexico system year ended Dec. 31 last, earned \$18.4 a share, against \$18.18 in 1924. Government report on crops places condition of Canadian wheat May 30 years, against 96 per cent. year ago, and 88 per cent. two years ago.

Certain products, four months ended April 30, 1925, showed a 10 per cent. increase in value over the corresponding period of 1924. The price advanced to within a point of the price established on January 28. This move took place despite a slight easing in the Brazil exchange rate. It could not be learned whether or not any buying from London has taken place in the present increased demand for the stock, but the fact remains that in London as well as in New York, a more cheerful tone is in evidence in commenting on the condition of the development of London buying would not be surprising.

Diver Near Death From Heat On River Bottom

PHILADELPHIA, June 11.—Leonard Miller, a deep-sea diver, was overcome by heat 40 feet below the surface of the Delaware river on Saturday and remained unconscious on the river bottom for more than 30 minutes before his helpers learned of the trouble. He was nearly dead when hauled to the surface. He was taken to Chester Hospital, where ice packs restored him to consciousness.

Sinclair officials stated the air pump had remained uncovered in the boiling sun and hence the air pumped to the diver was heated to such a high degree by the sun that the temperature in his diving suit probably was more than 115 degrees.

LIGHTNING HITS 4 TIMES IN ONE PLACE

House at Bedford Hills, New York, Gets Visitation in Single Night.

BEDFORD HILLS, N. Y., June 11.—Lightning, proverbially reputed never to strike twice in the same place, created a precedent by striking Judge Charles Haines' home on Old Croton Road four times in a single evening.

The first bolt struck the southern side of the house, ripping off boards and plaster and plowing an earth for 20 feet alongside the foundation. The family, after going out to see if the house was safe, went to bed again, but were driven out a few minutes later when the second bolt struck the south gable, leaping to an oak tree and stripped it of bark. The third bolt came down a chimney, scattered bricks, crossed the room, leaped through a window and destroyed a prize bed of rhododendrons. The fourth bolt, five minutes later, shattered an old locust tree, part of which fell against the house and shattered several windows.

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SAINT JOHN LADIES ADDRESS INSTITUTE

Mrs. J. D. Seeley and Miss Dykeman Heard by Women at Moncton.

MONCTON, June 11.—Reports of provincial conveners of standing committees were submitted at this morning's session of the thirteenth annual convention of the Women's Institute of New Brunswick. Mrs. C. J. Osman of Hillsboro presided.

Mrs. J. D. Seeley of Saint John, discussing home economics, urged development of New Brunswick's resources. She advocated, also, increased interest in provincial public affairs.

Mrs. M. G. Siddall of Port Elgin, reporting on agriculture, urged women to take greater interest in agriculture. The growth of cities, she pointed out, depended upon the prosperity of the farming sections.

DEPLORES EXODUS TO U. S.

Mrs. Siddall deplored the emigration of people to the United States, and urged that everything possible be done to prevent this.

Miss Huihota Dykeman, R. N., acting director of Public Health Nursing Service, Saint John, read a paper on public health and child welfare. She strongly emphasized the importance of caring for the health of the child. Miss Dykeman exhibited charts regarding the provincial death rate, which has been lowered since 1920.

EDUCATION REPORT.

Mrs. Charles Comben of Woodstock submitted a report on education. She reviewed facts given in 80 replies to a questionnaire she sent out to provincial branches. These showed that in many cases women have been taking a prominent part in improvement of school grounds. In many cases there is need of school consolidation. There is also an important work to be done by women in establishing school libraries.

A paper on "Boys and Girls' Swine Clubs in New Brunswick" was read by Miss Lily Davis of Port Elgin, whose proficiency in judging has attracted much attention. Miss Davis told of work done by herself and her sister, Miss Alice Davis.

The remainder of the session was taken up with the hearing of reports from branch institutes.
