So ran the old Scotch song about the tasty herring, a fish that does not find as large a market in Canada as it might.
Pickled in salt and brine, herring are put up in barrels, half-barrels and small kegs. Split and smoked they are marketed as bloaters and kippers. Then again, boneless smoked herring are sold in small boxes under the caption of Digby Chickens." Fresh water lake herring are sold as "Ciscoes" after being pickled and smoked. Kippered herring are put up in cans.

Now that the fresh summer vegetables are nothing but a pleasant memory the woman in the home is turning her attention to the winter variety now safely tored in the cellar. To make vegetable

Cut potatoes and carrots in small pieces. Add enough water to cover, and cook for twenty minutes. Do not drain off the water. Brown the chopped onion in the fat for five minutes. Add this and the tomatoes to the vegetables, Heat to boiling point. Add two cups of skim milk and thicken with flour substitute.
