GIRL BEATS OUT FLAMING CLOTHES

Saves Life of Young Electrician and Then Applies First

Aid.

New York, Aug. 25—In beating out the flames which made a human torch of Irving Jaffe, and in applying prompt first aid remedies, Edith Wilson made a heroine of herself and saved her fellow worker's life. Miss Wilson is twenty years old. Jaffe is twenty-one.

Miss Wilson, who is a bookkeeper, was at work in the front part of the ground floor of the building. Jaffe, an electrician, was busy in a rear compartment. Just before noon Miss Wilson was startled by a cry from the electrician, who staggered through the door a moment later a mass of flames. Miss Wilson snatched up two towels and a coat lying on a chair near her desk, and, first using the towels, quickly beat out the flames and then threw the coat around the electrician, who fainted from pain. The bookkeeper then ran into a grocery store next door, jumped on a counter, seized a can of solive oil, picked up an opener as she ran out, and by the time she got back to the side of the injured electrician had opened the can.

After she had applied olive oil to the olistered face, neck and chest of the roung electrician, she found Policeman Murphy of the Oak street station, who called an ambulance from St. Vincent's Hospital. 
