CUCUMBER TID-BITS.

licious way of serving cucumbers is a combination salad of rare merit. We will try some of these dishes. CUCUMBER JELLY.

Remove the peel from a number of cucumbers, chop or grate them fine and press out the juice. Season one pint of this juice with salt and cay-cane, add three tablespoonfuls of tarragon vinegar, and if not of a good green tint, add leaf green paste to get the desired color. Soak one-third of a box of gelatine in cold water, and when soft dissolve over hot water. Add this to the cucumber juice, max well and pour into wetted molds. When the jelly is firm you may serve by turning out on lettuce leaves. Serve mayonnaise dressing in a separate dish.

CUCUMBER JELLY SALAD.

Select three large, green cucumbers, and other sales and put into diese and put

pare them and cut into dice, and put into a saucepan with one onion cut fine, season well with sait and white pepper and add two tablespoonfuls of vinegar and three cupfuls of water. Stew slowly until very tender, and then add one-half a box of gelatine which has previously been soaked in cold water, and stir until dissolved. Strain through a cheese cloth. When cool and beginning to thicken line small molds, which have been wet in ice water, with thin slices of freshly cut cucumber, pour in the thickening jelly and set away on ice until it is hard and firm Serve on lettine leaves with mayonnaise.

STUFFED CUCUMBER SALAD. STUFFED CUCIMBER SALAD. Get some short, thick cucumbers, pare them and cut in halves lengthwise. After carefully scooping out the seeds drop the halves into ice water for an hour. For each three seucumbers seald and peel one ripe tomato, cut it into small diec, drain off the liquid and mix it with one cupful of finely cut watercress. Over the tomatoes and cress pour a dressing made by mixing two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, ten drops of onion juice and salt and white peper to season. Drain the cucumbers fill them with the mixture, pour over each a teaspoonful of olive oil and arrange stuffed side up on lettuce.

CUCUMBER SOUP.

Simmer in one pint of water four sliced cucumbers and two sliced on-ions until very soft, and then press through a sieve. To this add one pint of scalded milk, a thickening of one tablespoonful of butter and two of flour, a seasoning of salt and pepper and simmer slowly for ten minates. You may serve with croutons if you desire.
