A BODY FOUND INSIDE TRUNK MYSTERIOUS LETTER CONNECTED WITH IT

The Discovery Was Made on the Beach Near Elliott Bay, Seattle.

Seattle, Sept. 23.—The body of an unknown girl about 18 years of age was found in a trunk yesterday on the beach about two miles south of Elliott Bay.

St. Paul, Sept. 23.—J. B. Cavington of this city, whose firm's letter paper was found in the trunk containing the body of a young girl at Elliott Bay, near Seattle, gives the following explanation of how the firm's letter paper had come to be in the trunk.

Seattle, Sept. 23.—The dead body of a woman believed to be Mrs. Aggie Covington, was found in a trunk on the beach at West Seattle yesterday.
