Rotherhams has an extremely well balanced team, their wings are fast and feed the centre in excellent shape. All four leading can shoot. Their defence is also strong. Negotiations are now under way for a second game with the Victorias of Fredericton. The capitalists won on their own ice, but the Rotherhams boys were under a considerable handicap, judging by all accounts, owing to the peculiar style of refereeing adopted by the Fredericton official. They wish to have a true test of the two teams and are arranging for a game on neutral ice. If the Fredericton team accepts the challenge, a red-hot game of junior hockey may be anticipated.

BURGLAR TRACED BY FINGER MARK CLEVER.

Carried Off Club's Liquors and Cigars. But Left Telltale Sign on Dirty Glass.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—There's a suggestion of Oriental legerdemain in the story of the capture of some burglars who broke into a club in Bradford and carried off nearly a hundred bottles of different liquors and some hundred cigars.

The only thing the detectives could find as likely to afford a clue was a couple of dirty glasses out of which the burglars had taken a drink of whiskey. These were carefully examined and the trace of a finger print was found on one of them. This was found to correspond with the finger print of a well known criminal, who was promptly tracked down and confessed his guilt and to a share in the theft.

## LONDON TAKES LEAD IN HOTELS.

Recognized as One of the World's Cities of Pleasure

Palaces of Luxury for the Visitor Have Sprung Up with Rapid Growth in Recent Years.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—During the last week there has been issued the prospectus of a gigantic new hotel in London, to be erected in Piccadilly, on a site not far removed from that of the one time famous Albemarle, which is now closed, its late lessee having gone into bankruptcy.

Hard times and excessive competition in the matter of hotels were the reasons alleged for the assignment, and for some time past voices of sad prophets predicting a general hotel-keeping crash have been raised in the land.

Whether or not these dire predictions are ever likely to be realized there is apparently no unwillingness on the part of the public to invest its money in hotel enterprises.

As has been pointed out, in spite of the proverbial Anglo-Saxon love of privacy, London is rapidly becoming a city of hotels.

At the present moment there are six first-class hotels either being built or about to be built in London. Each of them will be a place of luxury. The new Ritz Hotel is rising on the site of the old Washington House. The new Piccadilly Hotel will occupy the present position of the St. James Hotel and restaurant, and the new Gaiety Hotel is rising from the ashes of the old one, and close by there will be the London Waldorf-Astoria.

In addition to these two other magnificent hotels have been planned, but the positions they will occupy are not yet made known for public information.

Twenty years ago the first class hotels of London could have been counted on the fingers of one hand, and a term of years ago the number of hotels had not the significance it has today.

Even ten years ago more than thirty well known London hotels of the present day were not in existence, among them being the Hotel Cecil, Hyde Park Hotel, Carlton Hotel, St. Ermin's Hotel, Claridge's Hotel and the Savoy Extension. In addition to these scores of temperance hotels, boarding houses and restaurants have been opened in every corner of the metropolis, all pointing indisputably to the fact that the public which lives and takes its meals away from home has increased out of all proportion to the increase of population.

Francis Cook, head of the firm of Thomas Cook & Sons, has given an opinion on the cause of this rapid increase.

"London is becoming recognized as one of the world's cities of pleasure," said Mr. Cook, "among Americans, at least. Ten or twelve years ago Americans almost invariably went to Paris. Now the considerably larger proportion prefer to visit London. The splendid hotel accommodation to be found here is partly the result of this invasion and partly responsible for it. There is no doubt London can now hold its own against any city in the world in this respect, and when the new hotels are finished it will tend the world."

"Yet a dozen years ago it had the reproach of being one of the worst places in the world to stay in, and deserved it."

H. Pruger, manager of the Savoy, considers people are becoming more civilized and consequently more luxurious. Mr. Pruger believes the desire for luxury is the strongest natural instinct.

"Hotels make customers," he said, "customers do not make hotels. You must not wait for your public before you build your hotel. Build your hotel and the public will come, provided you build the right hotel."
