BURNS NOMINATED

The Conservatives of Gloucester County at a convention held on Wednesday at Carleton Place, nominated T. M. Burns, of Bathurst, to oppose the Liberal standard-bearer, O. Turgeon, M.P.

Mr. Burns is a son of the late Kennedy F. Burns, who at one time represented Gloucester. Mr. Burns was a member of the provincial legislature for some years as a supporter of Hon. Messrs. Treadwell and Pugsley, but was defeated at the last general election by a large majority. Opposition will not worry Mr. Turgeon very much.

SUCCESS OF LAURIER'S TOUR UNPARALLELED

55,000 Attend Six Most
Enthusiastic Meet-
ings

Increase of Liberal
Strength in Ontario
Indicated

New Minister Joins Pro-
mier at North Bay
Meeting

Laurier Won't Promise
Georgian Canal—Must
Keep Down Expenses

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—The campaign of Sir Wilfrid Laurier through Ontario during the past ten days has been, from a Liberal standpoint, an unparalleled success. The crowds at every meeting have been of a record-breaking variety and the reception of the Prime Minister has been invariably of the utmost possible cordiality. It is safe to say that at the points visited no political leader in the history of Canada has ever been afforded a more flattering or enthusiastic greeting.

At Niagara Falls on Tuesday of last week an enormous throng of from 18,000 to 20,000 people gathered to hear Sir Wilfrid and Hon. Messrs. Graham and Lemieux. At Stratford the audience numbered fully 5,000, and was composed in large part of Scotch farmers of Midland and surrounding counties. At Tilbury 8,000 electors, including many of Sir Wilfrid's French-Canadian supporters from Essex and Kent counties, indicated by their enthusiastic reception of the leader of the government that southeastern Ontario shows no indication of going back on the present administration. At Clinton 6,000 representatives of Bruce, Huron and Perth counties repeated the reception given to the Premier in the southwestern peninsula. At Berlin on Thursday the meeting was conceded by everyone to be the finest political demonstration ever known in Waterloo county. The audience numbered 10,000 and every indication was given that W. L. Mackenzie King would carry this Conservative stronghold and represent his native county in the next parliament.

A significant feature of this meeting was the fact that a Conservative mayor and council declared the day a public holiday and the whole community turned out en masse to hear the leader of the government.

At North Bay today the same generous welcome was accorded Sir Wilfrid who was accompanied by his new colleague, Charles Murphy, K. C. On the whole, the reception accorded to Sir Wilfrid has been even more enthusiastic and cordial than was hoped for, and it was in marked contrast to Ontario's reception of the Liberal leader in the last two campaigns, when the charge was leveled at him that his political policy was unduly influenced by his Roman Catholic and French-Canadian affiliations.

With the result of the tour, Sir Wilfrid is himself greatly pleased and the fears that Ontario might possibly prove less favorable to him than in last election have been completely dispelled. The indications now are that on October 26th the result of the poll will show that the Conservative policy of slumber has been of no avail and that the Liberal contingent from this province will be stronger than in the parliament just dissolved.

TWO SURVIVORS

SERIOUSLY ILL

It is a Strange Coincidence
That Both Ross and
Price are Ill

St. John men, and particularly those on the West side, who are interested in aquatics, are speaking of the rather strange coincidence by which the two surviving members of the world-famous Paris crew are lying seriously ill. Elijah Ross and James Price, the two bow-boys of the champion four, are under doctor's care. Mr. Ross, who is in the hospital, underwent an operation two days ago, and last evening, although suffering a great deal, seemed considerably improved and confident of speedy recovery. A couple of weeks ago Mr. Price was taken ill with heart trouble on King street, West End. He is improving. Mr. Ross a few days ago was preparing to visit his old comrade, but look like he could do so was taken ill and had to be removed to the hospital. The other two members of the crew are dead, Samuel Hutton having been drowned in the 27mrose disaster, and Robert Fulton dying two years ago in Carleton.

SHINGLE FAMINE

HERE FOR MONTHS

Since Strike Started Not a
Shingle Machine Has
Been Running

There has been a shingle famine in St. John since the early spring, when the sawyers and burchers went on strike. Since that time not a single machine in the city has been in operation, and dealers have been importing stock from all over the province, chiefly from mills farther up the river. The striking workmen, many of them, seeing no prospect of steady employment, have been secured work at outside points. The famine will now be relieved to some extent, as a few days ago Stetson, Coter and Co. started two of their shingle machines and are turning out stock as fast as the saws will work. There was no blowing of horns about this, nor has there been a settlement with the strikers. The company simply realized that there was a strong demand for shingles, secured enough men to satisfactorily operate the machines and commenced work.

Laurier here this afternoon and made public acknowledgment of his gratitude to Sir Wilfrid for choosing him for the position. Discussing the political situation, Mr. Murphy said the opposition was so devoid of a policy of its own that its whole time and attention were being devoted to alleging wrong-doing on the part of their opponents. The statement that the Liberal government was kept in power by the solid vote of Quebec, he said, was a deliberate falsehood.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier retraversed the ground he had covered at the other meetings of his tour. It was expected that he would make some reference to the C. P. R. strike, but he made none. The strikers, though many attended the meeting, made no demonstration, being threatened by their leaders with expulsion from the union if there was any attempt at disturbance.

Treating of the Georgian Bay canal a matter of particular interest to North Bay, Sir Wilfrid said: "I must speak with perfect frankness. I cannot say whether we will be ready to commence building the canal today or tomorrow, because we have a falling revenue and a heavy expenditure on public works. But if Providence spares me and Canadian people leave me and my friends at the head of affairs, it will be our duty to take up the Georgian Bay canal as soon as the resources of the country permit us. These things, however, cannot all come at once."


