### MISSION FOR GIRLS WAS CLOSED YESTERDAY

Yesterday the closing exercises of the Home-makers' Circle in Glad Tidings Mission Hall were held. The Mission will be reopened in the autumn. During the fall and winter a number of ladies have conducted classes for the purpose of teaching children the art of making good homes. Among those attending have been numbers of motherless girls who are keeping house for their fathers and brothers. Others, many of them quite young, have been instructed in those simpler arts which will be of value to them later in life. The classes have been held every afternoon immediately on the closing of the schools. There has been an enrollment of about sixty, with an average attendance of forty. The young ladies in charge of the classes are Misses Lydie Kimball, Gladys Hegon, Lillian Delnatist, Kathleen Gills, Colie Fairweather, and Blanche Allen. The cooking school has been under the supervision of Miss Bessie Knight, a graduate of Guelph College of domestic science, and Miss Jeanette Delnatist.

The plan was adopted this year of giving the girls the garments they made. In the earlier days instruction in sewing was given and it was some time before the girls were qualified to make garments, but really excellent work was done by many members of the classes. The food cooked was given to the pupils as luncheon or to take home. The committee in charge have been encouraged by words of thanks and praise from the parents of those attending.

For yesterday's closing exercises the ladies prepared a five o'clock tea, nicely served, while the girls arranged a very enjoyable programme. It consisted chiefly of recitations and singing, a number of the selections, even by the youngest, being really fine. Classes will be strictly undenominational and have been attended by representatives of every denomination.

### CONDEMS THE PLAN OF RECEIVING DEPOSITS

Magistrate Says It is Not Right to Take Money From a Drunken Man.

Five drunks were arrested yesterday. One of the number, Wm. Cross, was gathered in twice inside of eight hours.

George Hubley pleaded not guilty to being drunk on Peters' wharf yesterday afternoon and claimed that he had been assaulted without cause by a man whom he did not know. He says he was not quite over his morning jag and feeling sick he took a couple of drinks as a brace and at 9:30 o'clock was again arrested. This time he had but \$12 in his pocket. He was remanded to jail until tomorrow for the purpose of getting straightened away. The magistrate said there seemed to be a misapprehension regarding these deposits being taken. He did not make the rules, and he thought where a poor unfortunate was arrested it was a pity to take his hard earned money as a deposit for his appearance in court the next morning and let him out only to get drunk again. "It is no reflection," he said, "and not with the intention of robbing any person that I make those remarks. It is only to protect the poor unfortunate. This statement is not made secretly, but openly from the bench. It has been stated that I make private rules. That is not so. It is not right to take money from a drunken man."

### ELKIN MAY BE WARDED INSTEAD OF KELLY

Something Has Caused a Number of the Aldermen to Change Their Minds.

It is understood that upon the county council coming to order this afternoon, Ald. Lewis will move that Ald. Elkin be elected warden. This will come as a surprise to many who believe that the honor would go to Ald. Kelly, the nominee of the common council's recent caucus. Just what has contributed to the alderman's change of faith is somewhat difficult of ascertaining, but the changes have been definitely agreed upon. It is stated that in the event of Ald. Elkin becoming a candidate for the position, Ald. Kelly will retire, as a majority of both the county and city members have announced their intention of supporting the Queen's ward alderman. Ald. Elkin stated that he was not hankering particularly after the job, but if the council desired him to have it he would consider it his duty to act.
