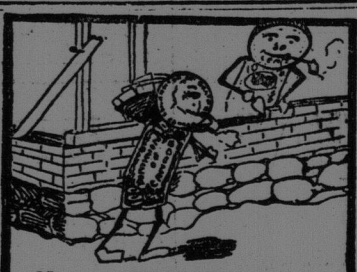

\$10,000,000 MORE

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 9—John D. Rockefeller today increased his donations to the General Education Board by a gift of \$10,000,000 and also released the Board from the obligation to hold in perpetuity the funds contributed by him.

The gift announced today by Frederick T. Gates, the chairman of the Board, brings Mr. Rockefeller's donations to the Education Board to \$62,000,000.

LONDON, July 9.—The City of Rome Children's Opera Company, no member of which is more than 16 years of age, has opened a short London season at Terry's Theatre, with Donizetti's opera, "Lucia di Lammermoor".

The company was formed in Italy four years ago by two brothers, Guido and Arnaldo Billand, who, besides training the children in matters musical, make themselves responsible for the entire education and general welfare of the children.

When on a tour, the children are always accompanied by a doctor, an apothecary and master and mistress for different subjects.

The terrific explosion wrecked windows for half a mile around causing considerable damage to nearby factories especially the plant of the Seitz Auto and Transmission Commission, where all of the windows were smashed and some of the machinery was thrown off its balance.

The girders were for use in an extension to the post office which is being constructed by Whitehead and Kaeser. The firm has conducted an "open shop" and has had more or less labor troubles as a result.

ALPINIST FALLS 1250 FEET

GENEVA, July 9.—Winkler, a Swiss Alpinist, who, together with three friends from St. Gall, successfully climbed the Dent de St. Julien, the highest peak in the Canton of Appenzel, fell yesterday 1250 feet down a precipice, and, landing in a mass of alders near a stream, escaped with some scratches and torn clothing.

The climbers were trying a short cut down to Weissbad when the accident occurred. Winkler's comrades had made arrangements to pass the night on the mountain and search for their friend's body in the morning, when the victim climbed up the precipice and surprised them. Winkler, leading the way, conducted the Alpinists to Weissbad, where they arrived safely late in the evening.
