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### Reconstruction of Bachelor Club Rink

Work being commenced immediately

Arrangements have been made for the reconstruction of the Bachelor Club Rink and the work of clearing the debris was stated yesterday morning.

Under the arrangement as completed, the Bachelor Club will assume the cost of erecting a steel frame which he about \$7,000.00 and the architect and contractor to gather the balance of the cost of the reconstruction.

The steel frame will be erected by the Robb Engineering Company of Amherst. Their engineer has examined the piers and he being of opinion that they are sufficiently strong to support the steel frame, the company will guarantee them.

The height of the new frame will be ten feet less than that of the old. The work should be completed in about six weeks.

The Bachelor Club has been obliged to apply to the town to guarantee a further amount of bonds, and the Town has agreed to apply for permission permitting them to guarantee additional bonds to the extent of \$10,000.00.

### FIRE IN HALL BUILDING DOES \$30,000.00 DAMAGE

J. W. Hall building on Canada Road was on Monday ruined by fire the origin of which is unknown. Mr. Hall attended the furnace at about eight o'clock Sunday evening and did not return until after midnight at which time no sign of fire had been noticed. The family was awakened by smoke at fire thirty o'clock Monday morning and investigation disclosed that the part of the building near the rear entrance to the house was on fire. By the time Mr. Hall returned to his apartment, the other occupants were able to escape from the building in night clothes and fur coats. The fire department was called immediately and quickly responded but the fire gained headway rapidly. The buildings were wooden and very dry. Eight streams of water were played on the flames for several hours before they were extinguished and it was necessary to continue two until late in the night in order to keep the fire from breaking out again.

In the meantime the contents were practically completely destroyed as it was impossible to remove anything until the afternoon. The building was occupied by Mr. Hall as a dwelling, office, and warehouse and by J. B. Clair, local Ford Dealer, as a showroom, the only car in which was removed without being damaged. Considerable feed and lumber stock in the warehouse were burned. It is estimated of buildings which were moved to their present location last spring and so encased in brick as to present a very pleasing front to the street.

The morning was extremely cold and calm otherwise other buildings might have been burned as the Hall property is surrounded by wooden buildings.

Mr. Hall has taken temporary offices on the second floor of the Long Building.

### APPEALS HEARD BEFORE JUDGE CARLETON

TWO CONVICTIONS SET ASIDE

Three appeals in liquor cases were heard before Judge Carleton on Wednesday Morning. The appeals were from the decisions of Mr. Hubert, Magistrate at Edmundston, whereby the defendants were found guilty of having liquor in their possession unlawfully and sentenced to pay a fine of \$1,000. or to spend six months in goal. The convictions

being for the second offenses. The appeal in the case of W. M. Birds of St-Leonards was allowed. The Judge holding that the place in which the liquor was found was not a hotel and that it was not, therefore, unlawful for the defendant to have it in his premises.

It was contended on behalf of Leonard Violette of St-Leonard that the room in which the liquor was found was the name of another party and that found was bona fide registered in the name of that party.

One bottle of beer was all that had been found on the premises of Jos. Mercuro of St-Basile, and the Judge intimated that on account of the smallness of the amount he would probably dismiss the appeal, for the present would take it under consideration.

Appeal was also heard in the case of Mr. Wahl Albert of St-Hilaire who had been convicted of interfering with the Police in the discharge of their duty. It was contended on his behalf that in making a search it is necessary that the written authority be on the person of the Officer making a search and that it be shown if asked for. The evidence in the case against Mrs. Albert did not disclose that the Officers making the search had any written authority on their persons to make the search and the appeal was therefore allowed.

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### OFF TO SOUTH AMERICA



Off to pioneer a pathway to South America in advance of the trade-tour party, sponsored by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, which sails on the C.N.S.S. "Princess Robert" from Halifax, N. S., on February 21st, next. Captain R. Forbes of the Canadian National Steamship "Canadian Pathfinder" greets the party. Dr. Brovedani, head of the Spanish Department of Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., who has been retained by the Dominion Department of Trade and Commerce to take charge of the publicity services for the Canadian Government at Buenos Aires in connection with the British Empire Trade Exhibition to be held there and who sails for South America on the "Princess Robert". He is of the opinion that there is a good opportunity for the development of Canadian trade with the Latin American republics, pointing out that the export trade from Canada has increased greatly during the past four or five years. He states there is a marked feeling of goodwill on the part of the people of South America, particularly the Argentine, towards the Canadian people and a preference for Canadian ways of doing business, which, while being extremely modern and progressive, yet are based on British principles.
