

Clippers Take New Record for Stallions

King Arion Breaks Record to Win 2.25 Race at Fredericton

New Mark for Trotting Stallions in Maritime Provinces Established Yesterday--Frank Patch and Son of Montrose Other Winners--Leonard Wilton in Straight Heats at Moncton.

Fredericton, July 1.—A fine warm day and the holiday brought out a large crowd for the second and closing day of the annual racing meeting of the Maritime Association at the Fredericton Park Association's holiday card of three races furnished some grand racing.

The feature of the day's sport was the wonderful performance of Arion, who reduced his record from 2:22 1/4 to 2:17 1/4, incidentally establishing a new record for trotting stallions in the Maritime Provinces on tracks in the Maritime Provinces.

Walter H., the winner of the 2:30 trot is the first of the get of Montrose to enter the 2:30 list. He was bred here by Dennis Hanlon, the veteran local horseman.

In the 2:18 pace there was nothing to it but Frank Patch after the opening heat, which was taken by Helen Gould, a bad acting mare driven by Tom Holmes.

Mary Cromwell, the richly bred Halifax owned mare, proved a big failure today. She was a prohibitive favorite in the 2:25 pace, but while she had lots of speed in stretches she could not negotiate turns of a half-mile track.

LONG TO BE REMEMBERED

Chinook and Dreadnought Winners of Two Important Races--Boat Parade and Illumination.

Member's day at the R.K.Y.C. might very well have been termed ladies' day. Trim maidens, lithe and fine of line, as racing yachts, with their chaperons constructed on the more opulent plans of house boats, were more in evidence than the mere male.

And the weather was lady's weather, fair as their faces, with a fresh breeze, and a subtle sparkle in the air that, as A. H. McDougall says, is only found in the atmosphere of Mill-dyville. The club house was gay with flags and the balconies like a bank of flowers, with the wonderful hats, and white railings of the ladies.

And the basin was crowded with craft of many kinds; steam yachts, gasoline launches, sailing cutters and canoes, darters to and fro, making a kaleidoscopic scene of life and color upon the deep blue of the waters.

And everybody seemed to be in gay spirits except the reporters, who couldn't find a yachtsman with sufficient nautical knowledge to know when to make the sun over the yard arm.

Salmon Boat Race.
The first race was started at 2:30. It was a contest between the salmon boats, Class B, for the Gregory cup. Three boats, the Mona, the Chinook and the Canana were entered. They got away in good style and went flying down the wind wing and wing at a great rate. After a straight run in-leeward they beat back against a stiff breeze, with their lee gunwales awash, crews clinging to the weather rail and the spray flashing over their heads.

The Chinook held the lead throughout the race, though on the first turn of the course she only gained a minute on the Mona. In the second round she slightly increased her lead, passing the Chinook a little less than three minutes ahead of the Mona.

Going Some.
The winning boat covered the course of seven miles, involving a dead beat to windward for half the race, in 1 hour and 14 minutes—good work for the type of craft.

The Dingies.
The dingy sailing race was the next on the programme. After a good deal of jockeying, three boats got away on a half-mile course toward the wind. The boats were rather cleverly handled, and the finish was somewhat exciting. D. Arnold Fox in the Dreadnought, succeeded in capturing the blue pennant for dingies, passing the line 30 seconds ahead of T. T. Harrington in the Wood Champlain.

A double canoe race was then pulled off. The Robt. Story Petros, Edna, Renie, Grace M. Frivater, Tana, Ethel M., Viking, Rossa, Blue, nose, Armorial and others. Ray Virtue was the winner in this race, with Howard Holder a close second and Secretary Porter, of the Exhibition Association, somewhat in the rear.

A tug-of-war contest between boats captained by E. Graves and W. Wingrove and a tilting match between Peter McAulay and J. W. B. Babbitt, Lawson and Roy Sippel had been arranged for, but the contestants did not come to the scratch.

A feature of the evening programme was the boat parade in the reach in front of the clubhouse.

Brilliant Spectacle.
A long procession of boats with oars raised, glided in a slow moving file in a wide curve towards the setting sun; then turned and swung back out of the red stillness of the sky.

At the conclusion of the outdoor programme, the members and the guests gathered in the club house, and a programme of dancing and songs was carried out with enthusiasm.

With the personnel of the team considerably changed and shifted about, the Clippers' outfit managed to capture two out of the three games played with the St. Johns yesterday. The men played a great exhibition in the morning and romped away with the game by the score of 5-1.

The Clippers won the afternoon game 3-2 and served up the evening one with the count of 5-4. Over 2000 persons witnessed the games and although errors figured prominently throughout the teams on the whole played great ball. The afternoon game was easily the best of the three, and was conceded by the fans to be one of the fastest exhibitions seen here in years.

The Morning Game.
Bovard's masterful pitching won the morning game for the St. Johns. He struck out 11 batters and allowed but seven scattered hits. The Boon was touched freely at times but managed to out pitch nicely when men were on bases. The Tilleyites played brilliant ball in the field, the team playing a perfect game except the exception of Ramsey's excusable error. Both catchers seemed to be playing in ill luck. In the first inning a foul tip hit Sprout on the right forefinger, splitting it badly. Mills replaced him behind the bat for the remainder of the game. In the seventh McLeod was hit on the knee and painfully injured. He was replaced by Rothesay. The St. Johns sent one run across the plate in the first inning, second and third.

They added one more in the seventh and put the game in when they added two more in the 9th.
