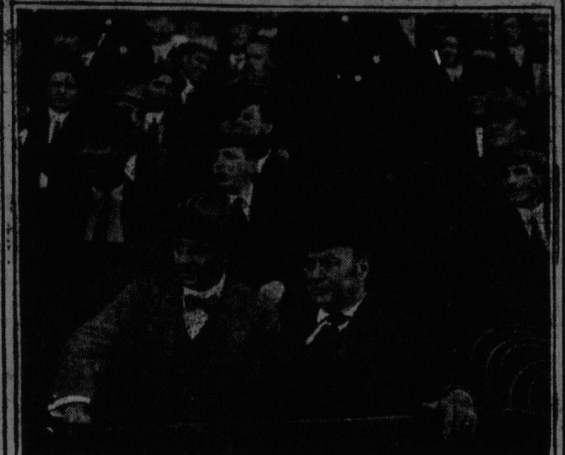

OLD CY YOUNG AND KLING BOTH PICK GIANTS TO WIN

Young also Selects Plank as Best Pitcher of Post Series Saying that He will do Better Work than Bender or Jacky Coombs.

Pittsburg, Penn., Sept. 27.—The question was put today by Denton ("Cy") Young, "the grand old man" of baseball, who is again pitching for Boston and has been nearly a quarter of a century in active playing harness.

Probably no player living today is better fitted to answer the question intelligently not only because of his long experience in "stating up" players and teams but because of two other great considerations.

"I will not talk about who will win," began Young, "as he who has to win many good points that it would be hard to say right now who will win."

"I look for the Giants to win the series, for they have proved the best base stealing team ever placed on the diamond. And that, too, although the Athletics have proved the best hitting and running team, for, according to the unofficial records published this week, the Athletics have made 270 in 125 games—against an average of 294 in—games, against 1191 hits and 677 runs—an average of 270 in 125 games."

"Yes, I expect the Giants to win the world's honors for the way they have been hitting all the good pitchers and stealing bases on the best catchers in the older organization should undoubtedly turn the trick."

Old Cy is not alone in his opinion that the New Yorkers will win. He is backed by Jack Kling, the great former Cub catcher, now with Boston, hardly less fitted than Cy himself to state an opinion on the matter that is near final as any baseball prediction can be.

BOSTON GIRL MADE RECORD CONEY SWIM

(New York Herald, Monday.) Miss Alice Akroyd, of East Boston, lowered all records in her swim from East Twenty-sixth street to Coney Island yesterday. Her design was to reach Steeplechase pier, but a late start brought her to Norton's Point after the tide had changed, and she was forced to give up her attempt when only a quarter of a mile from her goal.

Miss Akroyd tried the swim just two weeks before, but was attacked by vertigo off Governor's Island and was taken into her boat in weak condition. She is the only American girl swimmer who has been able to show superiority over her English sisters.

Yesterday morning Miss Akroyd started from the foot of East Twenty-sixth street at twelve minutes past ten o'clock. Those familiar with tidal conditions in local waters advised her to start at nine, but for some reason or other she lost more than an hour, before starting at the pier. She made excellent progress down the East River, but her greatest speed was obtained from the Battery to Coney Island.

This stretch was covered in four hours and ten minutes, creating a new record. She also established a new mark for the swim from East Twenty-sixth street to Norton's Point her best time being one hour and a quarter.
