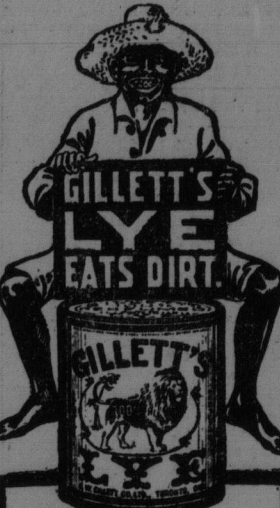

 Chancery Division.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
 A person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may be entitled to a homestead in the Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Canadian Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. The homestead must be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres, or on a vacant section by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader is entitled to a pre-emptive right to purchase alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead for six months in each of two years of six years from date of homestead entry, including the time required to earn a living on the land. The homesteader must also cultivate 40 acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.
