THE TURKISH ATTACK ON THE SUEZ CANAL; SCENE DURING FIGHTING AT TOUSSOUM.



This picture, drawn especially for this newspaper, the New York Herald and the London Sphere, depicts an incident which occurred during a night attack made by the Turks on Toussoum. Guarding the Egyptian side of the canal was a force of 1,000 men, who had dug trenches for themselves and otherwise prepared to give the enemy a hot reception. Under artillery fire the attempt, however, had to be abandoned. The picture shows the battle in full progress. To the right the Turks may be seen making the abortive attempt under a strong Anglo-Indian shell and rifle fire.

Belgium Scrupulously Kept Faith With Powers on Matter of Neutrality, King Albert Says

Belgian Monarch again denies his country by certain conversations compromised her neutrality — Unable to understand German's cruelty.

Geneva, Switzerland, Mar. 30. via Paris—"I am not a hero; you will find them in our trenches," said Albert, the King of the Belgians, at his headquarters in the field in an interview today with Edouard Chapuisat of the Journal de Geneve. During the conversation the guns of the Belgians and the Germans were sounding constantly.

"I affirm that before the war I and my country observed scrupulously all the requirements of neutrality that the powers prescribed for us with a precision of the specifications in an engineering contract.

"Your neutrality," said King Albert, referring to Switzerland, "is an act of sovereignty. Ours had been obligatory by an agreement of the powers. Nevertheless, you see the result."

At another point in the conversation, the King said: "You have an agency for prisoners and other institutions, but what a martyrdom has not this poor Geneva cross endured."

The King, alluding to the hardships which Belgium had undergone, said: "It is necessary to tell the truth about these things, but it is better to use moderate language because the more moderate so much stronger one is."

BET ON THE FIGHT

Havana, March 29.—Holiday crowds watched Jack Johnson and Jess Willard work hard today in their training for the heavyweight championship battle April 5. About 5,000 spectators including many women, witnessed the afternoon training. Willard showed to the capacity of the palm garden at Miramar. He worked for two hours and finished strong and in good wind. His early morning roadwork consisted of four miles, in a series of sprints.

Johnson drew more than 3,000 people and pleased the crowd with his fast and heavy hitting and clever footwork. He was on the road in the morning, doing about six miles, jogging and sprinting alternately. This was his hardest work of the week and his condition is better than for the past few days.

A feature of the day was the visit which President Menocal paid to Willard's camp. He expressed admiration for the young giant, although he had previously wagered \$100 on Johnson. He was accompanied by Police Commissioner Duque Estrada, who yesterday placed \$500 on Johnson.

A heavy sale of tickets for the fight went on throughout the day. The total sale, it is announced, has now reached more than \$60,000.

Among purchasers in the United States are Alfred G. Vanderbilt, three boxes; Edward and Ira Morris of Chicago, two boxes, and Edward Swift of Chicago, one box.

Many wagers have been laid, the odds carrying from 2 to 1 to 3 to 1, with Johnson the favorite. The largest bet to date is \$3,000 to \$1,000.

HARBOR REVENUES SHOW INCREASE

March will be at least \$7,000 ahead of corresponding month last year.

The harbor revenues have shown a substantial increase during the present month and Commissioner Russell said yesterday that the revenue for March would be at least \$7,000 ahead of the corresponding month last year. While the outward business through the port has increased materially the inward business has not been quite so great.

It was felt, however, that while there had been little talk of the work this year still the harbor business had been quite satisfactory.

Commissioner Russell said there had been harmony between the steamship men and the harbor officials and the season had passed without any serious complaints being made.

The harbor revenues for March will be ahead of any other month in the history of the winter port business and Commissioner Russell looks for good business in April.

The ferry, too, will have a good month and the commissioner felt that the end of the season would show a good record for all the departments under his direction.

OVER MILLION IN CASH CONTRIBUTED FOR THE RELIEF OF BELGIANS

New York, March 30.—The cash contributions to the Belgian Relief Fund, according to an announcement made by the committee tonight, passed the million dollar mark today. The exact amount collected so far is \$1,004,905.44, and is said to be the largest amount ever raised by a committee on behalf of foreign charity. The committee has also collected \$700,000 in food and the actual amount of food supplies it has sent into Belgium to date are valued at more than \$1,550,000.
