Today is the seventy-fifth anniversary of the slaying of Joseph Smith, the Mormon "prophet" and his brother, by a mob at Carthage, Ill. The centennial of the Church of the Sea and Land, the second oldest church in New York City, will be celebrated today.

**OVER DECISION TO SIGN.**

AMERONGEN, June 24.—News of Germany's decision to accept the peace terms, including the clauses providing for the delivery of the former German emperor to the allies, reached the castle late yesterday evening. Now, however, it apparently is realized that he is exiled forever from his country.
