Fritterfest Budget set at \$82,110 for September event

Times Staff Writer The executive committee of the Mississauga Community Festival Fritterfest '78 has developed a budget of \$82,110 for the production of the late September city-wide

The budget, originally estimated at \$50,700, had to be changed because of the increase in printing costs of the program, the central source of revenue for the Fritterfest '78.

The program was estimated to cost \$16,000 but it is actually closer to \$38,000.

The parade, the fireworks display, the beerfest and Port Credit activities all figured for the rest of the increase in expenses

The expenses are all projected costs. The committee won't have an official expenditure figure until Fritterfest has run its course

The major source of revenue is expected to come through the sale of the Fritterfest programs. The programs (see below), available at a cost of \$1 each, contain Mississauga history, maps and descriptions of the festivals activities and a lucky draw number. Revenue is expected to be \$82,612 with the sale of 75,000 programs. There are six draw prizes totalling \$8,600. All are trips to several destinations across the world. P. Lawson Travel, Wardair, Island Holiday Resorts, British West Indies Airlines, Canadian Pacific, Air Jamaica, Suntours and Air Canada are sponsoring the prizes.

Grants through Wintario and Loto Canada are not expected to be as helpful as hoped. Because of the type of festival being held. Win-tario will only donate approximately \$500. Loto Canada will only sponsor sporting events.
