With further reference to your communication of December 16th would say that I have fully gone into your case with the Department here and asked them to give me a statement of the situation so that I could forward it to you, fully explaining the conditions as they stand. This communication you will find enclosed.

Now I might say that I do find the Board willing to go a long way to meet situations such as yours, but the law on the statutes is along certain lines which they have got to follow, and indeed it is found that if they do not abide by the conditions as laid down in the acts, their resignation is generally asked for. I might also say that the Board had already committed themselves to your solicitor Mr. McIntyre before I came here. Had it not been for this it might have been possible that we could have got more consideration, but under those conditions I do not see that there is anything more that I can do at the present time. Sorry I cannot be of more service to you.
