In the case of Lieutenant Carle James MYCOCK of 45 General Transport, Royal Canadian Army Service Corps, an Officer of the Canadian Army, Overseas.

By direction of the Commanding Officer, this Supplementary Summary of Evidence is taken on oath.

SEVENTH WITNESS
Prosecution

K46682 Pte Melvin Carrell STONEY, of No 1 Canadian Repat Depot, attached to No 2 Canadian Discipline Unit (NWE) being duly Sworn, States:-

I am K46682 Pte Melvin Carrell STONEY of No 1 Canadian Repat Depot attached to No 2 Canadian Discipline Unit (NWE) About the last week in June/46 Pte Totland came to me and asked me if I would help him sell some cigarettes for Mr Mycock and I agreed to go along with him. We went to see Mr Mycock and he told us that he had approximately 25,000 cigarettes and that he wanted 25 cents for each cigarette. If we made anything over, we could split it between us. I picked up my work ticket for my 60 cwt lorry and had it signed by Lieut Mycock. Pte Totland & myself loaded the cigarettes into the back of the lorry. We went to Amsterdam & picked up a man on the street who directed us to a house, (perhaps his own) We took the cigarettes upstairs, where the man counted the cigarettes. Pte Totland received 105 English Pound notes and approximately 3,000 Guilders. We left the house and returned to Scheveningen, where Pte Totland & myself met Mr Mycock in his room at the American Hotel. Pte Totland then counted the money on the bed. After he had finished counting the money, he handed it to Mr Mycock. I think he gave Sgt Perry some money, who was also present in the room. Sgt Perry entered the room after we arrived. Pte Lorraine, who was Mr Mycock's batman at the time walked into the room at the time the money was being counted. He excused himself and walked out. Lieut Mycock handed Pte Totland 100 Guilden and then we returned to our billets

The accused declines to cross-examine this witness.

N56651 Pte LORRAINE Wilfred Jackson of 45th General Transport Royal Canadian Army Service Corps Canadian Army Overseas being duly sworn states:-

I am N56651 Pte LORRAINE Wilfred Jackson of 45th General Transport Royal Canadian Army Service Corps Canadian Army Overseas. One afternoon in June/46, I went into Mr Mycock's room for some laundry, as I was his batman. Mr Mycock was there also Pte Stoney and Mr Mycock's driver. I don't know his name, but I could recognise him. Pte Stoney was sitting on one bed and the driver was sitting on the other. I saw some money on the bed the driver was sitting on and the driver had some in his hands. I saw they were busy, so I excused myself and walked out. The money I saw on the bed & in the drivers hands was "Guilden", but I don't know how much there was.

The accused declines to cross-examine the witness.
