GETTING READY

Organizer Smith Says the Liberal Party is Now Actively Preparing for the Election

Alex. Smith, Toronto, secretary of he Liberal Association of Ontario, and organizer of the party, was present at the Liberal convention held in Ridgeon Monday.

In conversation with a Planet reporter he said :-

"We have never before had the voters' lists in better condition than we have them for the coming general elec-tions. We commenced at the begin-ning of last January and have them nearly completed. We have three stages which we have to put threm through First through the association, then the revision courts, and then the judges

"We adopted a new course this year and find it very successful The lists were looked after in each separate stage, and we completed them in their several stages before entering en another. The prospects for victory are more prosperous than they have ever been.

Mr. Smith is a tall, well-built, and intelligent looking man, and has served as secretary to the Ontario Liberal Association for the last eight years. During that time he has conducted four genera lelections, two Dominion, and two Provincial. It is his duty to visit the different municipalities and, visit the different municipalities and, to put life into the different Liberal associations. The places he visits are chiefly where the French are predominant or where the Liberals are in the minority. Already 40 Liberal candidates have been nominated for the coming election, and 30 who are at present members in the House, will probably be again candidates making present members in the house, was probably be again candidates making 76 candidates nomineated out of 94. This, Mr. Smith thinks, speaks well for their department of the work.

Mr. Smith is a highly educated gen-

tleman and a very pleasant conver-sationist. Early in life he made up his mind to be a lawyer, and in 1889 he enlisted in the reportorial staff of the Mail and Empire, of Toronto, working at night and studying law in

working at night and studying law in the day time. By constant pluck and steady perseverance, he gradually rose in his chosen profession, and in 1893 he graduated as a lawyer and was accepted at the bar. Shortly after his graduation he received the position which he now holds.

He is a warm personal friend of H. D. Smith, of Ridgetown, with whom he studied law in Toronto. These two gentlemen were in the same class at the university, studied in the same law office in Toronto, viz., that of A. McCrinnon, now a judge in the Ontario court, and both graduated at about the same time.
