Mgr. Merry del Val, who has just been appointed papal secretary of state by the Pope, was secretary to the conclave which elected Pius X. to the pontifical throne. It is understood that the nomination will not be made officially until the next consistory when Mer. dol. Vol. will Joseph sistory, when Mgr. del Val will also

be made a cardinal.

After the newly elected Pope had accepted the choice of the sacred college and had donned the white robes of office Mgr. del Val, by virtwo of his office, knelt before him and offered the papal white cap. With a slight smile Pope Pius X. trok the white cap and dropped the red cardinal's cap that he had been wearing on the head of Mgr. Merry

del Val. This donated, according to custom, that the recipient would shortly be raised to the cardinalate. The new papal secretary of state will be the youngest member of the sacred college, being only thirtysecred college, being only thirty-eight. He has had considerable ex-perience in the diplomatic relations of the Vatican.

Mgr. Merry del Val is a descendant
of one of Spain's noblest families.

His mother was an Englishwoman,
and he was born in London. His father at that time was secretary of the Spanish embassy to the court of St. James and later became Spanish ambassador to the Vatican.

Mgr Merry del Val's appointment as secretary of the consistory on the death of Pope Leo carried with it the secretaryship of the conclave fol-lowing and was held to presage further promotion. When Cardinal Rampolla, Pope Leo's secretary of state, gave up his office Mgr. del Val was intrusted with the duties of the Vatican's foreign office and has now been confirmed in that post by Pope Pius X.

Fifty Years on the Beach He Honor D. J. Hughes, senior Judge of the County Court of Elgin, retires from the discharge of the duties of his office after a full halfies of his office after a full half-century of service on the Bench. Judge Hughes has been a prominent citizen of St. Thomas through two generations. He was appointed to the county Judgeship on Sept. 29, 1853. At that time he was a part-ner of his brother-in-law, the late John Wilson, K.C., afterwards a Judge of the Common Pleas. He was called to the Bar in 1842 and was called to the Bar in 1842 and



practised law at Woodstock for five years. His unusually long service on the Bench, his ability and his knowledge of law, and the retention knowledge of law, and the retention of his powers and faculties beyond the fourscore mark, combine to make him a notable figure in the judiciary. Mrs. Hughes, to whom he was married in 1843, was his companion and helpmeet until only a few weeks ago, when her death occurred. Judge Hughes has taken an active interest in educational, philanthropic and religious affairs. For many years he has been an active member of Knox Church, St. Thomas. His political sympathies were with the old school of Conservatives.
