

In presenting his report in Church Life and Work and Systematic Benevolence to Montreal Presbytery, Rev. Prof. Fraser stated that he had addressed several 'etters to the various churches enquiring as to what methods of church work in the manner of soliciting subscriptions were being pursued, but in the large mawere being pursued, but in the large ma-jority of cases the answers received were most unsatisfactory, no details being fortheoming. In dealing with systematic benevolence, he quoted St. Paul's Church as heading the list closely followed by Crescent Street Church. The toti-amount subscribed in this manner reach-ed \$129,465, more than half of which was subscribed by the two shurebes algorithm. subscribed by the two churches already mentioned. With scarcely an exception each ohurch had increased its contribu-tion per family and per member over that tion per family and per member over that of last year. It was pointed out that the method of receiving contrabutions by means of small envelopes left in the pews was one that yielded general antisfaction. Rev. G. MacLennan, a gruduate of Knox College, who has had a charge in the United States, made application to be received into the Presbytemian church in Canada; and his request will be sent up to the general assembly.
