

illuminated by touches of spiritual insight and poetic beauty. His interpretation of the messages of Isaiah and Jeremiah make those great prophets, their times and their problems, stand out sharp and vivid. In the second volume one may see what Hebrew history and prophecy look like, as interpreted by a sane and temperate criticism. Very suggestive is the chapter on, The Temple and the Lord, which shows how the affection which for ages had gathered round the temple came to be concentrated upon Jesus Himself; and Professor Smith has never written anything finer than the first chapter on, The Essential City, with its wonderful description of the city as he watched it through a June night into the dawn. This is a great book: it will certainly not be displaced in our generation.

The author of, **Sidelights on the Bible** (The Religious Tract Society, London, U.C. Tract Society, Toronto, 160 pages, 54 illustrations, 35c. net), some years ago formed a collection of objects from the East that would throw light on subjects referred to in the Bible. With these before her, she was accustomed to give little lectures to her visitors. The illustrations in the book before us are photographs and sketches of some of these objects, as, for example, a locust, a wall phylactery, Oriental bread, and a sling of Palestine. All are exceedingly lifelike. The comments are the substance of the lectures, and are illuminating in the highest degree. This is just the sort of book for the teacher who wishes to make Oriental customs real and vivid to his scholars. It is worth many times its very moderate price.

"Keep your promise, keep your temper, keep your wicket up." This text from an address by Bishop Gore, of Birmingham, forms the outline of one of the thirty brief addresses gathered together in, **The Game of Life**: Talks to Boys and Girls, by J. D. Jones, M.A., B.D. (Thomas Law, London; U.C. Tract Society, Toronto, 139 pages, price 50c. net.) And capital addresses they are every one, which the boys and girls are sure to read. They are friendly chats about familiar things and the lessons for life to be found in them.
