And then, on motion of Mr. Planté, feconded by Mr. Berthelot, The Houfe adjourned till Monday next.

Monday, 17th March, 1800.

HE Houfe met at the usual hour.

Mr. Planté moved, feconded by Mr. Menut, that the House do adjourn.

A division enfued, and the names being called for, they were taken down, and are as follow:
