

BIG DISASTER AT EDMONTON

AWAY THOUSANDS OF LOGS
AND RAFTS OF LUMBER.

This morning the muddy waters of the river were alive with logs and floating debris. The heaviest logs are those of Fraser and the Edmonton Lumber Co. The large pocket boom of the Edmonton Lumber Co. was carried completely away, as was also a portion of the pocket boom of D. R. Fraser & Co., lower down the river.

Five years ago a similar calamity occurred but the quantity of logs carried away was much less. The weather of last week has caused snows in the mountains to melt and swell all the mountain streams.
