LOCAL NEWS.

Two very important and interesting cases will be tried at the spring assizes, which open in Brockville on the 27th inst. One will be the case brought by Messrs. Armstrong, Hines and Hicks against Rich. Arnold, to obtain damages for false arrest in connection with the dynamite explosion last fall, which damaged Mr. Arnold's house.

The other case is that of S. B. White against Abel Stevens for damages sustained by plaintiffs in Stevens' seizure and selling a quantity of plaintiff's chattels for an all-gold non-payment of rent.

The amendment to the game law fixes the close season for deer, elk, moose, reindeer or caribou, from 1st December to 31st October; that no hound or dog which pursues deer shall be allowed to run at large in a locality where deer are usually found between 1st and 15th November, under a penalty of not less than \$5 or more than \$25; and that every person desiring to hunt deer shall take out a special license for these on from the inspector for the district and shall pay, in addition to license fee, the sum of \$1 for every deer taken or killed, being required to make oath as to the number at the end of the season.

The Printer's Chronicle very pertinently remarks that some advertisers feel that the publisher of a newspaper is under an obligation for their patronage, and, if offended, threaten to withdraw it.
