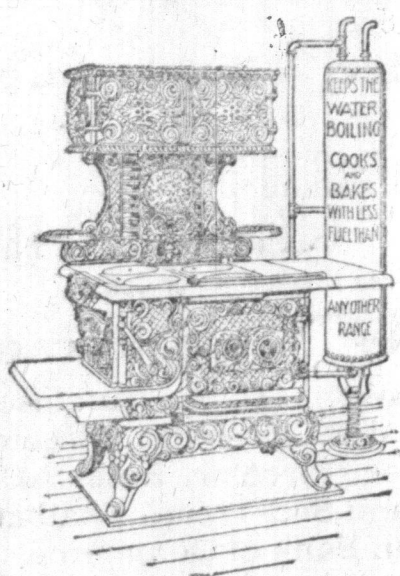

THE LENNOX ELECTION.

TRIAL OF THE PETITION AGAINST T. G. CARSCALLEN.

He Admits Retaining the Campaign Funds—One Charge Dismissed—Personal Bribery Under Investigation.

Napanee, Nov. 26.—The trial of the petition against Mr. T. G. Carscallen, the Conservative member-elect for Lennox in the Provincial Parliament, opened here yesterday before Mr. Justice Maclellan and Mr. Justice Oler. The court room was crowded to the suffocation, the witnesses not being excluded. The petitioners are represented by Messrs. Geo. H. Watson, K.C., W. S. Herrington, K.C., and T. B. German; the respondent by Messrs. Walter Cassels, K.C., Edmund Bristol, Eric Armour and G. F. Rutten. There are a great many witnesses present for the petition, and the cross-petition against Mr. Madole. Two charges were taken up. A charge of wholesale treating was dismissed. A charge of personal bribery against Mr. Carscallen is now under investigation.

Mr. Watson read from the examination for discovery of Mr. Carscallen, taken in Toronto. In it Mr. Carscallen stated that the Conservative organization in Lennox for Provincial and Dominion purposes was the same. He became a candidate in June, 1901. He had heard of John Carson being chairman of the Napanee committee. He had been in the committee-room in Napanee twice in the evening. Once there were two men in the room, smoking, Geo. Lewis, and a couple of boys from the flats.

He had not examined his election accounts, and did not know the amount of them. Mr. Rutten was supposed to look after the vote in Napanee. His personal expenses were \$11. He paid election expenses amounting to \$276.

Q.—Where did you get the money? A.—I got some of it from the Conservative Association at Toronto.

Q.—How much did you get from them? A.—\$300.

Q.—From whom did you get that? A.—I got a check from Mr. Bristol.

Q.—Do you know of any person advancing any money for any purpose connected with your election other than this \$300? A.—I got some; that is all.

Q.—From whom? A.—I got \$100 from Alexander Carscallen, Marquette.

Q.—Any sum from anyone else? A.—I got \$100 from Uriah Wilson, Napanee.

Q.—By check? A.—Yes.

Q.—What did you do with the money? A.—I put it in my pocket.

Q.—And then what did you do with it? A.—I used it in the ordinary way in business.

Q.—They sent it to you for the election? A.—It was sent to me to do what I liked with it.

Q.—Would it have been sent to you had there not been an election? A.—I really do not know.

Q.—Were there any letters with either of the two checks? A.—No.

Q.—And you put the money in your pocket? A.—Yes.

Q.—N. K. Osborne and Levi Kelly gave evidence on general agency, mentioning the names of men whom they had seen in the Conservative committee room, among others George Lewis and Peterson. Kelly testified that he had been drinking to-day, but on being asked who gave him the bottle he had in his pocket he became very indignant and demonstrative. Finally, by direction of the court, he was forcibly removed from the box and ejected from the court. As he was hauled from the court room he loudly assured the Judges that they could not fool him. His departure was followed by a series of puffs as a sign of a man falling or being hauled downstairs.

Charge 37 was first taken up. This was a charge that a large quantity of liquor was obtained for the purpose of treating on election day, and that liquor was given to Martin Maracle, Thomas Wales, Henry Howard, Charles Pearson, John Evans, Ed. Maracle, James Boleck, Thomas Pearson, James Mowers, John Woods, John Johnston and others.

Counsel then argued the case, and Judge Oler announced that both Judges were agreed that the charge had not been made out.

Judge Maclellan, acquiescing in the dismissal of the charge, said that the only case about which he had any doubt was the Higley case, and that was not mentioned in the charge.

Charge 22, that T. G. Carscallen, the candidate, personally bribed Fred Wisken, was next opened. Wisken was placed in the box, and swore that he is a laborer living in Bath, and assessed in North Fredericksburg. Some weeks before the election Mr. Carscallen canvassed him for his vote while he was in the bath.

Carscallen was accompanied by Tom Murdoch. Witness told him that he was acting as constable in Bath on election day, for which he would get a dollar, and as his vote would be twelve miles from Bath he could not give up that position to go and vote.

Mr. Carscallen said he would see that witness was taken to vote. Witness had always voted Liberal. He was caretaker of the Town Hall, looked after the village streets, etc., and received \$50 a year for so doing. When political meetings were held in the Town Hall he always received a dollar from the candidate.

Mr. Carscallen had a meeting, and when witness was putting out the lights on the platform, after he thought everyone had left the hall, Mr. Carscallen came to him and asked what he owed him.

Witness told him \$1. "He put a silver dollar in my hand," the witness continued, "and afterwards I turned it over in my hand, and there were two quarters underneath it. He asked me to give him a vote."

Q.—You never thought he paid you any money to bribe you? A.—No, I did not.

NEW PRIOR CABINET.

MR. EBERTS WILL REMAIN ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

Mr. McInnes Becomes President of the Council—Cabinet Now Complete—Mr. Denis Murphy's Election Campaign.

Victoria, B.C., Nov. 26.—The portfolio of Attorney-General was offered to Mr. McInnes yesterday at noon, and he was given till 10 to accept the same. At 10 o'clock he saw Col. Prior, and declined the portfolio, urging that Mr. Eberts be retained in that position. The result was the opening up of negotiations with Mr. Eberts, who finally agreed to remain in the Cabinet, Mr. McInnes contesting himself with the Presidency of the Council. The new Cabinet claims a support of 22 in the next House.

The new Cabinet is composed as follows:

Col. E. G. Prior, Premier and Minister of Mines.
Mr. D. M. Eberts, Attorney-General.
Mr. J. D. Prentice, Finance Minister.
Mr. W. C. Wells, Commissioner of Lands and Works.
Mr. Dennis Murphy, Provincial Secretary and Minister of Education.
Mr. W. W. B. McInnes, President of the Council.

Messrs. Eberts and McInnes will be sworn in to-morrow.

Mr. Denis Murphy left last night for West Yale to commence his campaign, preparatory to the bye-election. It is understood that the fight will be rushed, and that to-morrow's Gazette will announce the nomination for the 13th and the election for the 20th of December. Mr. Stuart Henderson of Ashcroft is a possible candidate for the Opposition.

BILLION DOLLAR PROVINCE.

Ontario Farm Property Reaches High-water Mark.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—The farm property in Ontario has passed the billion dollar mark in value for the first time in our history.

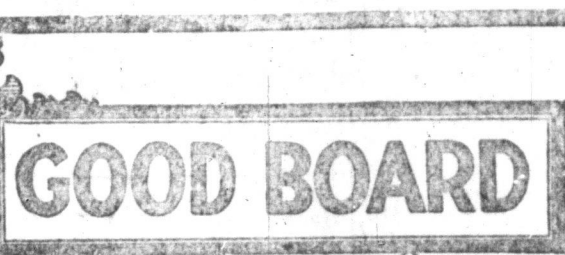
The returns of agricultural statistics, issued in a report yesterday by the Bureau of Industries, show that in 1901 the value of the farm lands, buildings, implements and live stock reached the total of \$1,001,225,290, compared with \$974,814,331 the previous year. The County of Middlesex leads with \$50,367,861, and Huron comes second with \$48,540,111.

The gross value of the cheese manufactured reached \$12,239,173, of which \$10,438 was paid to the milk producers, compared with \$12,025,025, and \$11,682,470 respectively in 1900.

The amount of chattel mortgages against farmers in Ontario was \$2,847,750 last year, compared with \$3,110,943 in 1900 and \$3,826,582 in 1899.

An appendix to the report shows that in 1900, the latest year for which figures are available, the total value of farm property in the United States was only \$20,514,901,838, or about half the value of farm property in Ontario, in proportion to population.
