Guatemala City, Guatemala, May 1.

-President Estrada Cabrerada of Guatemala' narrowly escaped assasination yesterday.

He left his private residence at 7.30 in the morning for his customary drive, accompanaed by his staff. On arriving in front of some houses on Seventh avenue, between 16th and 17th streets, an explosion, at first supposed to have been caused by a bomb, occurred, killing the horses attached to the president's carriage, wounding the coachman and injuring several staff officers, including Gen., Orellana, the chief of staff.

The president, who was nottinjured, displayed great presence of mind. Alighting from the carriage he inspected the surroundings and then returned on foot to his residence.

An inspection of the scene showed that the explosion had not been caused by a bomb, but by a mine. The conspirators dug a tunnel from one of the houses mentioned, rented by a man named Bafaol Bodil. placed ex-
