HIGH COST OF SCHOOL BOOKS IN NOVA SCOTIA

(From the Halifax Herald) Coincident with the opening of the pub ic schools of the city, which takes place to morrow, many complaints are being made with regard to the continued high price of text books of all kinds. Heads of fariles, especially those of the poorer class, fa ed with the neccessity of providing books for their children, say that although there has been some reduction in other necessi ties, evidently the downward revision does not effect the high cost of education.

In an interview with Dr. A.H. MacKay uperintendent of education, The Herald vas informed that the price list of text books as published in the April, 1922 edi tion of the Journal of Education, would emain unchanged for the balance of the ear. Those prices are the same as were in force in 1921 and previous year, when conditions were a great deal better than at present.

Complaints in this respect are not confined to residents of Halifax, but are becoming general throughout the province, and not only is the continued high price attacked, but a prominent member of the legal profession, a resident of Sydney, states that the text books authorized by the Council of Public Instruction for the province of Nova Scotia, are in many cases reprints of the Ontario editions, and are identical with those in use in the Ontario schools, in everything excepting price. At any rate, school book prices in that province are much more reasonable than here, as the following figures will show:
