A PIPE DREAM SAYS COBB.

Detroit, Sept. 3.—There is no foundation in fact for the story printed broadcast to the effect that Ty Cobb had received, and now had under consideration, an alluring offer from the Feds. The report stated that the "Georgia Peach" had been offered \$100,000 for a three-year contract and that the full amount was promised, regardless of any court action, such as an injunction. Cobb was seen just before the game this afternoon and declared the story was made out of whole cloth.

"I have received no such offer and never even heard of it until now," he said.

Asked what he would do if he should be made a proposition similar to that printed, Ty Cobb said tersely, "Nothing."

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 3.—Has Stuffy McInnis, first baseman of the Athletics, the only cog left of the famous \$100,000 infield jumped to the Feds. McInnis was not with the Athletics in St. Louis. A letter mailed to him has been returned to the writer in Philadelphia. It is said that Connie Mack has wired to various points in the country in an effort to locate his star. It is a known fact that E. C. Gordon, a representative of the wards in Brooklyn, interviewed McInnis three days before the team left for the west and that an attractive offer was made.

FITZSIMMONS VS. MATRIMONY.

Meuchen, N. J., Sept. 3.—That Bob Fitzsimmons' fourth matrimonial venture proved a failure was revealed when the county record divulged that his fourth wife, Temo Slonim, had placed a judgment against him for \$1,000. The present whereabouts of Mrs. Fitzsimmons is unknown. Bob's farm, cows and chickens were billed to be sold by the sheriff of Middlesex county last Wednesday, but it was postponed.

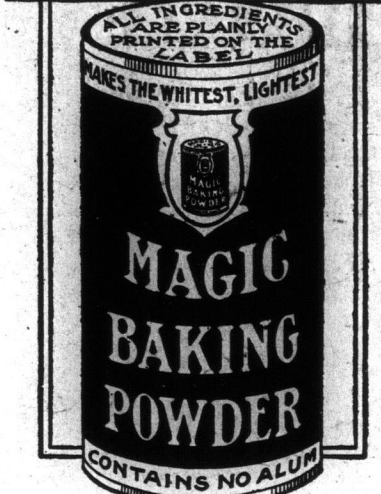

TEUTONS HAVE HAD ENOUGH OF WAR

Washington, Sept. 3.—The Pope's message will not be made public by this government, although there would be no objection if Cardinal Gibbons gives it out. Enough of the contents of the note is known, however, to give basis for indicating that Austria, Germany and Turkey are not adverse to discussing peace. London, Sept. 3.—In high official circles here it is learned authoritatively that recent rumors of peace have no foundation in any step taken by the British government or in any statement issued here from authoritative sources.

Washington, Sept. 3.—The United States will make no further effort to bring about peace in Europe until it has received information that its good offices will be welcomed by both sides in the conflict. This was stated authoritatively today in official discussions of the message from Pope Benedict, delivered to President Wilson yesterday by Cardinal Gibbons.

From the fact that the Vatican is in close touch with Austria, the construction placed by officials on the Pope's message is that the Germanic powers would be willing to discuss peace terms at this time. It was stated by those closest in touch with the administration that similar word will have to be received from Great Britain and the Allies before the President will make any further move.

President Wilson has made it clear several times that his original offer of services to bring about peace still stands and that he will do everything possible to further the movement. The United States, however, will do nothing likely to endanger its position as a friend to all belligerents, it was said authoritatively.

BUTTERMILK BEATS DOSES OF MYSTERY

San Francisco, Sept. 3.—Delegates to the dental congress are still discussing the remarkable address made before the congress yesterday by Garrett Newkirk of Pasadena, who declared that "the practice of medicine is full of superstitions, that it would take a ten-mile shelf piled three deep to hold all the dyspepsia prescriptions written this year alone," and that he found the practice of dentistry more honest than prescribing a dose of mystery every hour or giving bread pills for supposed ills. The fact that Dr. Newkirk was formerly a practicing physician caused his utterances to create a sensation among his audience. Dr. Newkirk said a bottle of buttermilk was better than all the prescriptions written for dyspepsia, yet people take the prescriptions through superstition. He asserted that the medical profession had not yet learned the true value of water in its practice.

SERBS FRUSTRATE AUSTRIAN PLANS

Nish, Sept. 3.—The Serbian War Office today made public the following official communication: "On the Danube front the enemy's work of fortifying was interrupted at the village of Starchevo. On the Sava front similar work was interrupted at the village of Trogar, opposite Ulnakaada. "On Wednesday on the Sava front the enemy's work of fortifying opposite Jobitchina Bara and Shelinkaada was stopped by the fire of our infantry. On the same front toward Penck there has been brief artillery fighting, one of our batteries discovering the enemy's guns and immediately reduced them to silence."

RUSSIANS ARE EVACUATING GRODNO

Berlin, Sept. 3.—It was claimed in an official statement issued here today that the army of Field Marshal von Hindenburg has occupied Grodno the last of the strong fortresses on that line retained by the Russians. It also was claimed that the German troops which are attempting to advance on the Russian port of Riga on the Baltic, have made a further gain by capturing a position northwest of Friedricstadt, which is about forty miles from Riga.

London, Sept. 3.—The evacuation of Grodno is under way. Petrograd has stated officially that the Russians are being withdrawn from the right bank of the Niemen. It has been evident for some time that Grand Duke Nicholas had no intention of allowing the number of men required to maintain a long defence to be penned up in any fortress which could be invested.

Along the Galician border General Ivanoff continues to retire, but not without inflicting heavy losses on the Austro-German forces, which have been shaken several times by vigorous counter attacks. In the centre and the extreme north the Germans are making very little progress. The Russians have won another local success near Vilna.
