LAST HOPE OF THE CZAR.

Russian Squadron Steaming Northward as Fast
as Possible—No Stop at Saigon.

The Position of Togo's Fleet Not Definitely
Known at Present.

AMERICAN SHIPPERS FEAR RUSSIAN FLEET.

SINGAPORE, April 12.—The Russian fleet was in latitude 5 degrees north, longitude 105 degrees 15 mins. east, at noon April 11. The Peninsular and Oriental steamer Numbia, which has arrived here reports having passed no less than forty two vessels there. They were steaming north east at a speed of eight or ten knots. The position of the fleet was then about three hundred miles north eastward of the Natunna Islands (which lie between the Malay peninsula and the west coast of Borneo) and more than 200 miles south-east of Cape St. Jacques. This course indicates that the fleet was not going to Saigon, French Cochinchina. The German collier Hindoo, which was refused clearance papers for Saigon, was released today on the captain agreeing to deliver his cargo through the British consul at Saigon.

AUTONOMY BILLS DEBATE

Will Not Close Before the Easter Adjournment—
Oliver May Not be Opposed in Alberta.

TORONTO, Ont., April 13.—The Globe's Ottawa special says: "All idea of bringing the debate on the motion for a second reading of the Autonomy bills to a close before the Easter adjournment has now been abandoned. The House will take a rest from Wednesday, April 19th, to Tuesday, April 25th, and then debate will go on; but not, it is hoped, for very long thereafter. An understanding was reached yesterday to try

and have the second reading by May 2. Talk, however, is only a tentative date and members who have not spoken by that time may still insist upon placing themselves on record. Mr. Oliver said that the Government may tend to shorten the proceedings. The advisability of opposing the Minister of Interior has been discussed by the Opposition, but there now is an evident disinclination on the part of the Tories to place a candidate in the field.

This is What the Fishermen Will Drop Under Bond Act.

Americans May Get Their Bait Outside Three Mile Limit.

Seal Fishing in Newfoundland a Complete Failure.

SYDNEY, N. S. April 13.—Advises received by Steamer Bruce from Port aux Basques state that the seal fishery in Newfoundland this spring has been a complete failure. The enforcement of the new Bond fishing bill means a loss to the fishermen in the out harbor of fully one million dollars. It is expected that Canadian vessels, being exempt, will now buy bait from Newfoundland fishermen, and sell to American schooners outside the three mile limit, and thus practically nullify the operations of the bill should it come into effect.

GURNEYS WIN OUT.

Verdict for \$1,500 Against Six Unions in St. Catherine's, Ont.

ST. CATHERINE'S, Ont., April 13.—The jury awarded a verdict of \$1,500 against six unions of this city in the suit begun by the Gurney Manufacturing Co., of Toronto, Ont., on account of the unions having put Gurney goods on unfair list. The Gurney Co. asked for damages of five thousand dollars against each member of the six unions, ten thousand dollars from the union collectively, and injunction to retain them from further boycotting the firm's goods. The origin of the suit is that in 1902 the Gurney Co. decided to run an open shop and the unions retaliated against the business of the company throughout the province. Judge Anglin decided the point of liability himself. The jury assessed the damages.

CANADIAN STOCK MARKET.

Toledo Electric Remains the Feature on Montreal Exchange.

The Price Changes Today in Dominion Iron.

Dominion Coal Not in Demand—Prices Quoted for Other Stocks

MONTREAL, April 13.—Trading in the stock market during the forenoon was unattended by any price changes of importance, and trading was on the dull side. The strong feature of the list continued to be Toledo Electric which sold at 39 1/2, after having reacted from 37 to 38 yesterday. There were some transactions in Dominion Iron Pfd. at 60 and Common at 22. These show no change, but the Preferred continued to be offered at 60. Dominion Coal continued a soft feature at 79 1/2, but the reaction is not surprising as the view was maintained in conservative quarters that the recent advance above \$5 the price was high and not warranted by any circumstances connected with the stock other than that those in control could put it pretty much where they wished. Montreal Power was a steady feature at 92 to 93, and Lake of the Woods Mining sold at 107 to 108.

\$1,500 DAMAGES.

C. P. R. Pays for Death of Carter-James Dillon of Toronto.

TORONTO, April 13.—The C. P. R. has consented to pay \$1,500 damages for the death of James Dillon and his settlement was approved by the Court at Osgoode Hall yesterday. Dillon was a carter for the Elton Rogers Coal Co. and on February 23, 1904, while crossing the track on the Esplanade from the Company's coal sheds he was struck by a C. P. R. engine and immediately killed. \$1,500 will be paid into Court for the benefit of his widow and two children.
