## Deferred Matter.

[Crowded out last week.] James Gordon Bennett's new yacht, the "Namouna," is the largest and most costly fitted out steam yacht ever built in the United States. She is of iron, has three masts, and is about 700 tons capacity. Her dimensions, in fact, exceed those of the first ocean steamers, she being about 227 feet over all, 217 feet water line, 26 feet beam. The "Namouua" has noth hand and steam steering gear and steam wind-lass and capstan. The barrel of the capstan and head are solid bronze, and nickle plated and galvanized and fancy brass work abound all over the vessel. Rails, bulwarks, sky lights, combings &c., are of teak, as are the panellings of the deck houses. The "Namouna" has a double tandem, vertical com-pound engine surface condenser, two high pressure cylinders, 23 by 28, and two low ones 42 by 28. She has two cylindrical boilers. She carries 150 ions of coal in her bunkers, and has a condensing apparatus that supplies plenty of fresh water daily. The accommodations for owner and guests are forward and those of the officers and crew are aft. The "Namouna" is lighted with electric lamps. The main saloon, staterooms, and ladies' saloons are exquisitely decorated and furnished. Bennett is to leave shortly with a select party for a trip to


